CENSUS 2013 NEW ZEALAND CENSUS 2013

2013 CENSUS

Statistics New Zealand is required by law to hold a census every five years. The census scheduled for March 2011 was postponed following the Christchurch earthquake in February 2011.

With the gap between censuses this time being seven years instead of five years, it is more important that every single person completes a census form either on line or collected at your door by a census collector.

The information you give in the census is needed for planning vital public services such as education, health, housing and transport. It is also used to help understand how our society changes over time.

Together we can provide a picture of New Zealand at this point in time and we need everyone to take part for that picture to be an accurate one. It will tell us more about who we are and where our taxes need to be spent.

During the period 16 February to 5 March 2013, expect a visit from the census collector to deliver a dwelling form and a personal form for every person staying in your house to fill out, on the Tuesday 5 March 2013.

We invite you to fill the forms out on line, it is much easier and you then don't have to be bothered by the collector again. Your collector can show you how to do this.

From 6 March to 17 March if you have not completed them on line the forms will be collected.

The next census is on Tuesday 5 March 2013 and will be an exciting event for all New Zealand.







by a nose and Taylor Buckley a very close third.


The parents/teachers vs children's race was also a nail-biter with the adults winning on the last stroke.

LET'S LOOK FORWARD FOR EUREKA

In 2006 the people of Eureka got together, formed a Community Planning Committee and, with the help of Waikato District Council, sorted out a Community Plan.

The idea caught on, and the districts which surround us, Newstead, Matangi, and Tauwhare, also produced Community Plans over time.

The Council reports that it has found these plans to be of great help in developing the wider district plans, including the Structure Plans which sort out the infrastructure needed for new growth areas and developments.

We've had our Plan now for seven years, and the Council has suggested that we, and the other districts, review our plans at the same time, with the findings possibly printed together in one larger booklet this time, with separate sections for each district.

Longer term residents may, or may not, still have their copy of the 2006 plan, but those newer to the district could possibly be unaware of its existence.

The original plan had some high sounding Links to Community Outcomes, but also a page of Specific Issues and Projects that Eurekans felt strongly about for their area.

We've seen some changes in seven years (eg having our local primary school closed), but we've also achieved a number of the goals we set as specifics. These include the changes around the Eureka/Hunter Rd/SH26 intersection, with yellow lines and big signage, a bus stop on SH26 at the Hall for the kids to catch buses to town schools, a reduction in speed limits and barrier indicators on Eureka Road to make it safer to walk along to the garage/shop and main road. And recently we got a great deal on storage facilities for our considerable local archives, which will go in the Hall.

We also had a number of meetings with Council people about recreation facilities and walking tracks. Unfortunately the GFC and tight budgets have precluded much in the way of results on that yet. We were invited to attend a Council get together of Community Board and Committee reps on the topic of waste disposal, to help them progress their aspirations for zero waste by 2020. And don't forget we've also got recycling these days, which was a huge step forward a few years ago.

So: As the current Chair of our Community Planning Committee I've met with Chairs from the other districts and the Council, and we've been asked to call separate local meetings of our residents to start the thinking on updating our Plan. The Council wants to do the whole process by mid-year, to fit round their planning dates, so we'll need to get on with it.

I've booked the Eureka Hall for 7pm on Wednesday 6th March and we'd love it if you'd all turn up with your ideas for what you want, and don't want, for Eureka in the next five years. The Council will also come and talk about the wider issues, but this is OUR chance to say how we see our community and what we want for Eureka. Getting our Plan gave us recognition by both Council and Government agencies. So when we get a chance to use 'People Power' let's use it!

3 eggs 21/2 cups flour 1/2 cup yoghurt

Zucchini/Courgette Chocolate Cake (yum)

125g butter 1 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup cocoa

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons baking soda

1/2 teaspoon mixed spice (or can swap for powdered chilli)

1 cup grated cheese

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 cup bacon/ham chopped

1 cup flour

1 teaspoon vanilla essence

3 cups grated Zucchini/Courgette (squeeze juice out)

IN YOUR GARDEN



Trust all you wonderful gardeners have had a good break and are all well rested and are raring to go as there is much to be done in the garden.

After the first blooming, many roses and hydrangeas lose their vigour. This is often due to water stress and in their weakened state they may succumb to diseases. Cut them back, water regularly and in the case of roses, feed them well. At the end of the day, all your plants really want is a little love and attention.

Feel the heat. Hot colours look great in autumn gardens. Last call to plant vibrant rudbeckias and heleniums for autumn show. Try burnt-orange for effect.

Forward planning. February is a good month to order plants. It may still be ridiculously hot outside, but garden centres order their winter selection of trees and scrubs now. If you are taken with a rare tree, or want a hard to find rose, ask now. It's also a good time to source fruit trees if you want them on dwarf stock. Snap up early spring bulbs, in garden centres now, especially the favourites like the highly scented Freesia and the Anemone "The Bride". Cool season charmers can be sown now. Try Calendulas, Pansies and Iceland popples.

Propagate your own plants to save money. Take cuttings now from Kalmias, Clematis and Fuchsias. Side shoots of favourite Hydrangeas can also be removed and planted directly into the garden, they will soon grow new roots.

Your vegle garden may end up with huge gaps this month where your potato and pea crops have been dug out. Rather than leaving bare spots for weeds, sow onions and plenty of them. They will love the well-conditioned soil, and any nitrogen nodules left behind by peas. Deal to the weeds before they set seed. Pluck them out or cut the stems off just below the soil's surface with a sharp hoe. Drag the weeds off to the compost bin to roast or seeding weeds are best in the rubbish bin.

Give your vegetable crops a helping hand with soil moisture and feed to give them further advantage. Sow parsley everywhere, you'll never have too much. It looks good in the flower garden too. Don't forget to tidy up the Strawberry bed and plant Silverbeet.

I could go on and on, but most important is mulch to retain water, harvest tomatoes, cucumbers, sweet corn, zucchini, bestroot, beans. Make sauces, chutney, soups and pickles, jams and preserves. Tired at the thought of it all, i am!

Blueberries

They are delicious and nutritious!

Blueberries are high in Vitamin A and C, contain many important minerals and are low in calories – 45 calories per half cup

Unlike many berries which are so sour they have to be cooked with sugar to-make them palatable, blueberries are naturally sweet and can be eaten raw, so preserving their vitamin C.

Blueberries are nature's convenience food, needing no peeling, hulling or pitting. They will keep for up to three weeks in the refrigerator and can be frozen indefinitely. Frozen blueberries remain free flow, and can be used the same as

Fresh blueberries make a delicious and attractive addition to fruit salad.

you would need to eat around 200 g of fresh berries to meet the average adult's daily requirement.

Traditionally, the berries were dried and used to cure diarrhoea and food poisioning. Medical research now offers a scientific

basis for such remedies for they contain antibacterial compounds (called anthocyanins) which are particularly effective against some forms of E. coli, the main culprits in many gastrointestinal disorders.

Like many other berry fruits, blueberries are potential causes of allergic reactions, the most common symptoms of which are swelling of the lips and eyelids, and an itchy swollen rash.

Wholemeal Blueberry Muffins

2 cups plain flour 1 cup wholemeal flour

1 cup what germ/bran 3 tsp baking powder

4 tbsp butter (melted) 2 tbsp golden syrup

1 tsp cinnamon

1.2 tsp nutmeg 2 eggs

1.2 cup sugar 2 cups blueberries


1 1/2 cups milk

Method:

Combine dry ingredients. Mix milk with beaten egg and sugar, add to dry ingredients. Mix in golden syrup and meited butter. Fold in blueberries. Spoon into patty pans. Sprinkle each muffin with cinnamon and sugar mixed in equal quantities. Bake at 200c (400F) for 10-12 mins.

Deadline approaches for entries in the RWNZ Enterprising Rural Women Awards 2013





"With closing date of Friday 15 March now around the corner, we're reminding women to send in their entries," says Rural Women New Zealand national president, Liz Evans.

In their fifth year, the Awards attract good publicity for both entrants and winners, says Mrs. Evans.

"Rural Women New Zealand's aim is to grow dynamic rural communities, and giving a boost to women in rural business is a very positive way of achieving this."

Last year's winner, Rose Voice of The Real Dog Equipment Company, urges women to enter, though she says she needed encouragement to do so herself.

"It's a typical Klwi trait – and perhaps more for females – to think what they do is not good enough. But just go for it – don't have any doubts."

Since winning the award, Mrs Voice has seen her business go from strength to strength. She's taken on two extra machinists to keep up with demand for her specialist canine products and publicity surrounding the award has led to bookings for speaking engagements through to the end of the year.

The Awards attract diverse entries, and past winners include a traditional-style cheese maker, a farm walk and homestay enterprise, a forestry trucking company, and a merino sock manufacturer.

This year's award categories reflect this diversity.

The categories are 'Love of the Land' sponsored by Agrisea, for all animal and land-based businesses; 'Help I Need Someone' sponsored by Telecom, for enterprises providing a service; 'Making It In Rural' sponsored by Fly Buys for manufacturing and creative businesses; and 'Stay, Play, Rural' sponsored by Access Homehealth for tourism and hospitality ventures.

The Enterprising Rural Women Awards 2013 are open to small businesses with 10 full-time staff or less that have been operating for at least two years. If in partnership, women must be an active partner of 50 per cent or more. Past entrants are welcome to enter again. Each category winner will receive \$1000 and a trophy. They will go on to compete for the Supreme Award 2013, which will be announced at the Rural Women New Zealand national conference in Christchurch on Thursday 23 May, where rural fashion entrepreneur Peri Drysdale of Untouched World will be the special guest speaker.

As I write, the Eureka Discussion Group is due to go to Martin and Mark Sings on SHWY 26 at Motumaoho, 10:45am on Tuesday 12th March. One of the interesting things will be comparing their 2 farms side by side and at different levels of feed inputs, through DairyBase.

Should this become a combined Summer Dry" event you will be notified by the usual text messages.


Lessons learned in the big dry of 2008 have seen many farmers much better prepared this time with supplement on hand. If this were not the case then then 2 – 4 kg DM of pasture commonly being fed, with little supplement, would result in very hungry cows or herds dried off.

MilkSmart Has Been And Gone

The big North Waikato MilkSmart event held on February 19th at Tainui Rd was a big success with the 200 farmers attending rating it very highly. Many aspects of milking efficiency and innovation were discussed.

Puppy and Kitten Care

Summer is a busy time of year at the clinic. Lots of new pets are coming in to visit us for the first time. Kittens and puppies are bundles of energy that need lots of care to ensure that they develop into strong healthy adults.



Here is some basic information about caring for your puppy and kitten:

Feeding

Pupples and kittens are actively growing in front of you. It is really important that your pet is fed a good quality puppy or kitten food. This will help them to develop:

- strong bones
- · glossy coat

- · a good immune system
- a healthy body

You may be surprised at how affordable a premium diet is when worked out on a daily rate. Premium foods have all their dietary requirements for growth and development and need no extra supplementation. Discount vouchers are available in the vaccination puppy/kitten packs to help get you started.

Worming and Flea Control

Worm burdens can cause some serious problems in puppies and kittens. Very young pets need regular worming up to 12 weeks of age and then they can be wormed once every 3 months from this age. Make sure that you are treating for both tapeworm and round worms.

The hot humid weather in the Walkato provides perfect conditions for flea numbers to grow rapidly and can infest your house as well as your pet. Did you realise that 1 flea left untreated can produce 1.4 million eggs! Make sure that all the pets in the house are treated. There are a number of products available that target the fleas specifically and are therefore safe to use on your young pet as well as being safe to you, e.g. Frontline Plus, Advantage, Advocate, Revolution, Comfortis.

Vaccination

These are very important to the long term health of your young pet. They provide immunity against a wide range of diseases that can be fatal in your pets, or leave them with on going medical issues after their infection. You will be given a new pet pack filled with food, vouchers and lots of useful information when your puppy/kitten have their vaccinations.

Puppy Classes / Socialisation

It is important to introduce puppies to different breeds and environments to ensure that your dog turns into a sociable adult which is not scared of new situations. The clinic runs puppy classes throughout the year, please phone the clinic for more details.

Desexing

There are so many unwanted puppies and kittens that the SPCA has to deal with yearly. Desexing your pet is a sensible way to control the cat and dog population in this country. Generally this is done at 6months of age. For more information please contact the clinic.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Over the last decade, in collaboration with Community Committees, Council has been consulting with communities to develop Community Plans. These plans reflect the aspiration and vision of the communities and highlight the key issues and projects the community wishes to address. Council is now in the process of reviewing these plans. Sue Edmonds, the Chair of the Fureka Community Committee, has an article in this issue of the Express about a consultation meeting at Eureka Hall on 6th March, come along and give your thoughts for the future of your community. In my last article I mentioned a planned update of the **Community Halls Draft Terms of Reference** (TOR). Four meetings are planned through the district to discuss this document and a meeting was held at Puketaha on 26th February, attended by hall committee members from Puketaha, Eureka and other surrounding districts. The consensus of the meeting was that the Draft TOR should be put aside and an existing document, Hall Management Committees Responsibilities, used by hall committees for a number of years but not a formal policy of Council, be put before Council for consideration and then sent to Hall Committees for comment and further consultation.

We are currently working on the 2013 / 14 Draft Annual Plan (budget).

Key issues for consultation are likely to include:

- Roading budget being less than anticipated various options for use of this money Rates the rates increase of 2.37 per cent for 2013/14 as indicated in the Long Term Plan is now proposed to be 1.87 per cent - reflecting the proposed distribution of the roading funding through the general rate and other budget adjustments.
- Suggestions for targeted rates
- Raglan Sunday bus service
- Regional initiatives
- Retention of \$20,000 set aside in the Long Term Plan for grants and donations and, if retained, what types of grants and donations should be made.

As part of maintaining a safe and efficient rural roading network the Council is required to trim the branches of trees that are on the road reserve or, in some cases, on private land. The work is usually done at the same time the road reserve is mown with the mower blade lifted up to trim excess foliage. If you think trees on your property might be affected and want to ensure your trees are trimmed as you would like, it would be best to do the work yourself before the tree encroaches on the road and poses a safety risk to

You will know there is a total fire ban in the District. You need to be aware that if a fire is lit on your property and gets out of control you can be held liable for the cost of fighting the fire. During a restricted fire season permits are required for all fires in the open air within rural and urban areas of the Waikato except for barbecues, hangis and fires in properly constructed incinerators. If you have any enquiries contact Council's call centre.

To help conserve water supplies (and save money) - If you have a water meter read it regularly so you will be able to notice discrepancies. Higher than usual water usage could indicate a water leak that needs to be fixed.




