HEARTSafe AED (Automated External Defibrillator)

Did you know?

- Out of hospital cardiac arrest OHCA (heart stoppage) is NZ's 2nd biggest killer
- 35 people a week, 1800 per year, have an OHCA
- Only 5% survive if nothing is done.
- This improves to 15% surviving (to hospital discharge) if Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is started by a bystander as soon as it happens and continued until an ambulance arrives.
- If a 'public access' defibrillator (AED) is available and used before an ambulance arrives the patient's chances of surviving to be discharged from hospital increase by 69% compared to only a 24% improvement if an AED is used after the ambulance arrives....So easy local access to an AED is critical to survival.

The Eureka Express and the Eureka Hall committees are proposing to place an AED in a lockbox with 24 hour, 7 day a week access at the Eureka Hall.

How will this help?... If we make this happen then if someone near you has a cardiac arrest, dial 111 and call an ambulance immediately. While you do CPR send someone to the Eureka hall to grab the AED (details will follow), head back to the patient, open the AED, follow the very clear and easy spoken instructions as to how to use it.... And hopefully save a life.

The AED has to be near where you live (or where the event happens) and accessible quickly 24/7. After 5 minutes without breathing following a cardiac arrest a patient starts to decline by 10% per minute. So after only 15 minutes it may be too late to make a save, unless something has been done.

So we want to place a 24/7 accessible AED in the midst of our Eureka Community.

HEARTsafe Cambridge has agreed to provide a lockbox to house it safely and it will be located on the outside front wall of the Eureka Hall. They will also provide a demonstration and training in how to use an AED, and provide a refresher in CPR.

This will happen on Sunday March 19.

Details will follow in the February Eureka Express.

Below is a table showing the latest collated NZ National results and our own National Standards results for this year. We are very pleased with our results, especially as teachers work very hard to provide an holistic curriculum which is not based solely on academics, but which encompasses the arts, sports, Enviro sustainability, science and social sciences, school trips and outings, and which builds on children's interests and strengths.

We are required to report on these three areas of the curriculum and on Maori achievement. Our school has 183 children, 25% are Maori children.



TASTE BUDS

Some ideas for Christmas...

Crispy Smashed Potatoes With Bacon

- 1.5kg chat potatoes
- 1 tablespoon polenta
- 2 small lemons, thickly sliced
- 6 garlic cloves, unpeeled
- 2 rashers thick shortcut bacon, diced
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

Method

Preheat oven to 200C/180C fan-forced. Line 2 large baking trays with baking paper.

Place potatoes in a large saucepan. Cover with cold

water. Bring to the boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium. Simmer, partially covered, for 10 to 12 minutes or until potatoes are just tender. Drain. Stand for 5 minutes.

Transfer potatoes to prepared trays. Using a potato masher, gently press down on potatoes to flatten. Sprinkle potatoes with polenta. Arrange lemon slices around potatoes. Using a small, sharp knife, cut a slit in each garlic clove and place on prepared trays. Sprinkle with bacon and drizzle with oil. Season with salt and pepper.

Roast potatoes for 40 minutes, swapping trays halfway through cooking, or until golden and crisp. Serve.



150g butter, chopped

200g dark chocolate, chopped

1/2 cup raw caster sugar

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 cup plain flour

1/4 cup cocoa powder

100g white chocolate, chopped

6 green glace cherries, halved, thinly sliced

6 red glace cherries, finely chopped

METHOD

Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan-forced. Lightly grease a 24-hole, 1 1/2 tablespoon-capacity mini muffin pan.

Place butter and dark chocolate in a large heatproof microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on MEDIUM (50%) for 2 to 3 minutes, stirring every minute with a metal spoon, or until melted and smooth. Stir in sugar. Stand for 10 minutes to cool slightly. Whisk in eggs and vanilla. Sift over flour and cocoa. Whisk to combine.

Divide mixture between prepared holes. Level tops with a small spatula or spoon. Bake for 12 minutes or until tops are firm. Stand in pan for 5 minutes. Turn top-side down onto a wire rack to cool completely.

Place white chocolate in a heatproof microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on MEDIUM (50%) for 1 to 2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds with a metal spoon, or until melted and smooth. Drizzle teaspoons of melted chocolate over each brownie to form 'custard'. Top with 2 pieces green glace cherry to make holly leaves and a few pieces of red glace cherry for berries. Stand for 20 minutes or until chocolate has set. Serve.





AND ON A LIGHTER NOTE

Just a timely reminder from Dinah, with regard to possible Health and Safety issues that may arise in your businesses, at this time of the year. Have a great Christmas and keep safe if you are dashing through the snow (overseas) or on NZ roads during this holiday period.

A risk assessment must be submitted before an open sleigh is considered safe for members of the public to travel on. The risk assessment must also consider whether it is appropriate to use only one horse for such a venture, particularly if passengers are of larger proportions. Please note, permission must be gained from landowners before removal of fences (to get a good run) and entering their paddocks. To avoid offending those not participating in celebrations, we would request that laughter is moderate only and not loud enough to be considered a noise nuisance.

While shepherds watched Their flocks by night All seated on the ground The angel of the Lord came down And glory shone around

The union of Shepherd's has complained that it breaches health and safety regulations to insist that shepherds watch their flocks without appropriate seating arrangements being provided, therefore benches, stools and orthopaedic chairs are now available, and should be provided. Shepherds have also requested that due to the inclement weather conditions at this time of year that they should watch their flocks via CCTV cameras from centrally heated/cooled shepherd observation huts.

Please note, the angel of the lord is reminded that before shining his / her glory all around she / he must ascertain that all shepherds have been issued with glasses capable of filtering out the harmful effects of UVA, UVB and Glory.

DairyNZ - COMMENT FOR EUREKA EXPRESS

November/December 2016

Baby Morgan

Probably by the time you get to read this Jaimee and Peter will have had their first baby. It was due on November 27th. Jaimee is keen to get back as CO for the Hamilton North area as soon as possible. At this stage, she is due to come back in early June. In the mean-time her discussion groups are planned out over this time and will mostly be covered by Contractors. If there is something you would normally ring Jaimee about, please call me on 027 483 9820 in the first instance and I will either help or refer you on to an appropriate person.

Kaikoura

DairyNZ's CEO, Tim Mackle has family with dairy farms in Kaikoura badly knocked around by the big earthquake. Among other things, they have no water and with permission from MPI have had to cut fences so the herd can get water from the streams. It is an animal welfare issue - stock have to have water. Interestingly only about 30% of the cows knew how to drink out of a stream. A legacy of 10-15 years of fenced water ways!

Healthy Rivers

A series of 11 farmer meetings were held by DairyNZ during November with 830 farmers attending. They were held to inform farmers about the Healthy Rivers plan rule changes and to gauge farmer concerns that could help shape submissions. Anybody can make a submission of support or concern. This has to be done by early March 2017.

Make sure you are acting on good information. Get the facts, get good advice and talk it over with as many people as possible because there is no doubt it will affect the way you farm in the future. For many it won't require a big change in the next 10 years but for a few it will.

"Farmer A" attended the Gordonton Healthy Rivers meeting. I met them in the street a few days later and they weren't happy with having to redo all their fences. Despite it being clarified at the meeting, they didn't realise they don't have to move existing fences. It is only new fences that have to have setbacks dependent on the slope of the land. Im setback if less than an average 15 degrees and 3m setback from the permanent water way between 15 and 25 degrees. If you have existing fences ½ m from a stream, they can stay as they are.

\$6 milk price

A lift in milk price forecast is great news and puts a spring in the step as you go about the daily routines of running a dairy farm. Over the years, we notice that good dairy farmers (profitable, productive and resilient) work on margins irrespective of the milk price. As the milk price lifts, they are still thinking of the margins they can make. Yes, they will spend a bit more and catch up on deferred maintenance but the focus will be on keeping the cost of production down and paying off debt too.

Lessons learned

If you haven't done it already it would be good to write down all the things you have done differently in the last 2 challenging years and build into your future approach to the business some of the best of these learnings. What would they be? Perhaps spending a bit more time and effort on pasture management. Monitoring the finances more rigorously. Getting quotes on significant items of expenditure i.e. shopping around a bit and being conscious of the welfare of neighbours and indeed yourself and your family.

- Have enough of the right players To calculate the number of bulls required, firstly calculate the number of cows still left to get in calf after AB. You'll need one 2-year-old bull in the paddock for every 30 of these girls. Double this number of bulls to get your two teams. Source enough fit, well-conditioned bulls; and reject scruffy characters. If in doubt get them health checked; you can't afford a dud.
- Watch the players Are they getting the job done? Plenty can go wrong with bulls, so regular observation of them working is essential to identify problems early. If he's not up to the job, we recommend remove and replace him as soon as possible. Call the clinic if you want your bulls checked.
- Rotation policy Rotate your bull teams every 48 hours to help keep your bulls interested in the girls and to optimise their fertility. Like players recovering from a game, bulls still need high quality feed; so make sure your resting paddock has adequate feed.
- Save their feet Lameness is serious and a waste of a good player! Prevention strategies are important. Leave them in the paddock, don't let them onto the yard, avoid long walks on rough tracks, and don't hassle them with the dogs.
- Safety first Make sure that your staff are trained to work with bulls. If there are any bulls that are aggressive, replace them to reduce the risk of injury to staff and cows.
- After-match review Use pregnancy testing Information to assess how the bulls went: early-aged pregnancy testing generates in-calf rate graphs in MINDA™ that will show you how things went through the whole of mating.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR



The end of another busy year - it is hard to believe that Christmas is just around the corner.

Council was sworn in on the 27th October and the last six weeks has been taken up with normal Council meetings and induction sessions to bring the new Councillors up to speed on the workings of Council, with briefings and workshops on current projects and plans for the next triennium.

Waikato District offices will be closed from 3pm on Friday 23rd of December – normal hours will resume on Wednesday 4th January. To report any urgent problems or situations you can still phone Council on the free phone number 0800 492 452. Rubbish collections do not change in the weeks leading up to Christmas Day,. However there will be no collection on Monday 26 December or Monday 2nd January so your rubbish collection will take place one day later until normal services return by 9 January.

Council is looking to help build our communities as our population grows. We are aiming to revitalise our towns and villages through "Placemaking": We have been promoting the concept in Tauwhare in recent months and the Community Committee has been very proactive in consulting the community and coming up with ideas for a project that will reflect "their place". I look forward to seeing their plans come to fruition.

Further to comments in my last newsletter around the Healthy River Plan Change for Waikato and Waipa Rivers. The Regional Council is holding a series of information open days on the proposed Change. This gives farmers, growers, businesses and the general community a chance to understand the details of what's being proposed. An Open Day was held in Matangi, on 8th December to enable those who attended to better understand the Change and give their views.

As the District representative on the Hauraki Gulf Forum I receive information on all matters relating to the Gulf. The Hauraki Gulf/Tikapa Moana Marine Spatial Plan was released to the public this week at functions in Auckland and Thames. The Plan represents three years of intensive collaboration by the Stakeholders Working Group and I was able to attend the function in Thames. The latest copy of our **newsletter**, **Link**, is now being distributed and includes articles on Freedom Camping; liquor ban areas, fire permit information, district heritage, noise control, roading and other interesting articles. You should receive this newsletter in your mail box unless you have a 'no junk mail' sign. It can also be read on line or a copy can be picked up at any Council office.

We are working through the responses to the survey we undertook to see what residents thought about shops being open for trading on Easter Sunday. Councillors have been briefed on the survey results and an approach for a second round of consultation is being discussed.

The cost is Adults \$150; Youth \$100. You can purchase your pass at reception or phone them on 0800 835 637 and pay by credit card. You then register at reception on arrival each time and they'll keep track of your usage and can remind you to renew.

Council will not meet during January but I can still be contacted via phone/email or txt.




