


It Ain't Half Hot Mum! LET's GET THOSE RABBITS

In my role on the Central Zone Catchment Committee I am now well known around the Regional Council, so when I asked if we could discuss the problem at one of our committee meetings, the Zone Manager visited the Animal Pest Management group and asked what could be done for people living rurally around Hamilton, and mentioned there were a lot at Eureka.



They offered to send their technical expert out to talk to a community meeting and do a demonstration of what is effective. But they did stress that any efforts need to be done by groups of neighbours, rather than individuals, to be effective in knocking off sufficient warrens at a time to make a difference. They even have some seed funding to help us.

So I've booked the Eureka Hall for 7.30 on Tuesday 8 March (after the Zumba class is finished), and booked the expert to come.

I know that some people have guns (we had what sounded like WWIII down Hooper Rd the other night) and others have dogs. I have an elderly cat who does his best by bringing me the little ones (generally in the middle of the night). But it's not enough to make significant kill rates, and after July we can expect to see the population balloon again.

It's not so much the rabbits themselves that I find the problem. It's the endless half dug holes along fencelines, under buildings, and in the middle of paddocks. I fell down one the other day in long grass, and I have a donkey with a lame back leg at present, and I'm sure he's done the same, because it isn't the season for laminitis. I have warrens under my house, my garage, my goat shed, and another shed, not to mention all over the lawns.

So if you are cursing both the rabbits and the pockmarks in your lawns and pastures, please join me at the Eureka Hall at 7.30 on Tuesday 8 March, and we can form groups and find out how to eradicate at least some of them.



FAREWELL TO EUREKA. Sadly, we must bid farewell to long-term resident, Jeanette Broome, and also to her long-term assistant Moss Brooking. Jeanette has kindly written about her arrival and establishment in Eureka with husband, Jack, and children, Paul and Carey 42 years ago, (see article within) but has modestly not mentioned her achievements and successes as a thoroughbred breeder, and her years of service to the racing industry which earned her an ONZM (Officer of the NZ Order of Merit) in the New Year's honours list of January 2000 (see below). You really put Eureka on the map, Jeanette, and you are wished a long, relaxing retirement

Mrs Broome has been involved in the thoroughbred horse breeding industry for approximately 28 years and is regarded as one of New Zealand's leading horse breeders. breeding successes included Jezebel, winner of the 1998 Melbourne Cup, and Seagram, winner of the 1991 English Grand National. Mrs Broome was the driving force behind the establishment of the Waikato Equine Cadet Scheme which has offered training and guidance to young people entering the training and breeding industry for almost 20 years.

Jeanette's Life at Eureka.

Having lived in Eureka for 42 years, I am now sad to have come to the point of having to sell up and move on. I have to say I am eternally grateful to my late husband Jack for being agreeable to cut our ties with the family hotel business in Lower Hutt back in 1973 and allow me to indulge my life-long dream of breeding racehorses.

It was obvious that the Waikato was the ideal place to set up an establishment for such an enterprise. So the first step was to acquire a suitable property. We purchased just on 100 acres from the Harris family, Peter and Ethel who were share milking on their family land along the Eureka straight. The homestead was very old and somewhat run down, but we had ideas of doing it up and living in it and although it was basically sound it smelled terrible of old age and was very damp, being surrounded by big, old trees and overgrown shrubs. There was also and ancient orchard of 40 or 50 neglected fruit trees which were well past producing any decent fruit.

We then decided to pull the old house down which I think may have upset some of the locals as I think it had some historic value, having been built around 1912. There were 4 fireplaces, the one in the sitting room had a beautiful mahogany surround and mantelpiece which we saved and had restored. It was in corporate in the new house where it remains today.

While the new house was being built, we lived in the two bedroom cottage, adding a 20 foot caravan as accommodation for our sone Paul, who was at Boy's High whilst daughter Carey was attending Hillcrest High. Of course we had to have an income and 100 acres was too small to be an economical dairy unit. So with the help of a friend, Len Jackson we started trading in dairy heifers. I was a quick learner and had an eye for quality stock. In

those days it was a very lucrative business with 3 stock sales a week, Cambridge, Frankton, and Morrinsville. So it was possible to buy a nice heifer close to profit at Cambridge on a Monday and on-sell her a week or so later at Morrinsville. Transport was much cheaper back then when the Edwards family ran Eureka Transport, but before long cost of fuel etc. saw the end of this very profitable business.

It did not take Jack long to realise he was not cut out to be a farmer. So he started work at the Freezing Works at Cambridge which was a good paying job. He travelled back and forth on his motorbike having always been a keen bikie. He later joined the Ulysses Motor Cycle club and enjoyed his retirement touring New Zealand from top to bottom.

At about this time Moss Brooking came into our lives when he took up relief work on the dairy farm next door. A keen and accomplished horseman he was attracted by the fact that I had by this time acquired several broodmares and was in need of help with the resulting progeny. After the new home was built we put in a very large in-ground swimming pool which left us with a mountain of soil to deal with.

Moss had many other skills and suggested we make a raised up garden out of it. We had a truck of our own and were able to access a large quantity of suitable stones in an area of Piopio and he and Jack proceeded to put in an ornamental stone wall around the large mound. Between them they also dug out and cemented a goldfish and lily pond.

Next came a trip down to the forestry where Moss had contacts and a load of Ponga logs came up with which to build a covered in BBQ area, a changing room and an area for the pool filter. Then came the mammoth task of surround the area with cobblestones. All this was not accomplished overnight but when finished looked very professional.

Several years passed with our primary interest in thoroughbred breeding remaining, and using dry stock to appropriately manage the farm.

Around 2005 it began to look evident that Jack's health was deteriorating and he was later diagnosed with dementia. As his conditioned worsened he was committed to Rossendale Dementia Care Home, where sadly he spent the last three years of his life from 2008 to 2011. By this time Moss had become a member of our family and stayed on to help manage the farm. Eventually the farm had to be sold as I became increasingly immobile and have now moved into Cascades Retirement Home. I spend my days in front of TV and hate having to go out in the wheelchair. Old age comes to us all but I am grateful of my happy memories and my time at Eureka, and of the wonderful horses I bred whilst living there.

Staff work very hard to remain at the cutting edge of educational initiatives and research. We have quite an exciting range of learning opportunities this year including SOLO Taxonomy with Pam Hook as our facilitator and the context: Our People, Our Place. All teachers & teacher aides are training as CogMed coaches to deliver an intensive computer based programme designed to improve working memory for children struggling to retain basic facts, spelling and concentration. Senior teachers are working with ALL (Accelerated Literacy Learning) targeting boys writing in particular and 2 teachers are involved with IYT (Incredible Years for Teachers) which looks at positive behaviour management initiatives. About Playgroups:

No child is too young for playgroup. All children from 0-5 years, including babies, love new experiences and benefit from developing sensory, social and communication skills through activities at playgroup.

Children like playgroup because they can:

- Participate in new experiences
- Develop and increase their social skills

- Learn sharing, co-operation and simple routines
- Interact with other adults and children in a safe environment
- Enjoy learning more about their world.

Adults also benefit from playgroup - a time to talk, meet other local families and make new friends and share experiences, while children have fun and learn through play.

IN YOUR GARDEN

The Drought this year is said to be one of the worst ever recorded.

Yes, some of us have had rain every now and then but overall it is very dry for those of us who have missed the rain.

Under these conditions plants are under great stress through lack of moisture.

Plants in tubs or pots need watering daily as these plants can not send their roots down looking for moisture because of pot restrictions.

In hot conditions trees in very dry soil have been known to dry out and die.

When planting any plant in summer normally dig a hole bigger than plant or bag, put water into the hole, when water has drained put mushroom compost into the hole then remove bag or pot from the plant. Do not disturb the roots mass. If



roots are going around the root mass just cut downwards in 3 or 4 places around the root base but do not disturb the roots, if you do tease the roots the plant has less than 50% chance of survival.

A Cheap way of keeping your garden damp is to lay out a soaker hose or trickle irrigation all of which are available at bulk stores.

Keep planting veggies including leeks, carrots, lettuce, broccolis, herbs, silverbeet, beetroot and more.

When fruit trees have finished fruiting you can summer prune or trim them.

Fruit trees should have centre branches cut no higher than a meter from the ground — this only



applies to young trees. Older trees, which have not been pruned for years, should be trimmed back to a manageable height; this will encourage new growth which most fruits grow from.

Any other trees shrubs or hedges can also be trimmed back when fruiting and flowering is finished.

Always try and keep young plants weed free. When planting, spread mushroom compost on the top of the ground around trees and plants. Don't heap around stems of younger trees or

plants. By putting compost on the garden you will eliminate about 80% of weeds.

1 cup sugar


3 apples, peeled, cored and diced (lcm)

Bake at 180 C for 35 to 40 minutes or until the top is golden brown and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Keeps for about 3 days.

Apple French Toast

Thick slices of bread are stuffed with sautéed apples in this decadent French toast recipe

Ingredients

2 tbsp. unsalted butter

4 large crisp-sweet apples

% tsp. nutmeg

% c. granulated sugar

1 loaf bread

3 large eggs

¹/2 c. milk

% tsp. cinnamon

Pinch of salt

Confectioners' sugar

Directions

In a large skillet over medium heat, melt butter. Add apples and 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg and cook until apples begin to brown, about 5 minutes. Add 2 tablespoons water and granulated sugar; stir to coat apples. Cook until fruit is tender, about 5 more minutes, then set aside.

Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Heat oven to 180° . Fit a baking pan with a wire rack; set aside. Make a 2-inch slit into each bread slice to create a pocket. Stuff about 3 tablespoons apple mixture into each bread pocket; press to close. In a large, shallow bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, cinnamon, salt and remaining 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.

Brush skillet with butter. Dip bread slices into egg mixture; cook until golden, about 2 minutes per side. Transfer to prepared baking pan; bake batch until heated through, 12 to 15 minutes. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

Discussion Group

The February Eureka Discussion Group was held at Graeme and Karen Bonnar's Property on Woodlands Rd. Josh Eales and Meghan Rogers are the Managers. The property has been under close attention with local farmers as it is the local Tactics for Tight Times Focus Farm. Historically the property ran with a stocking rate (SR) of 2.8 Friesian Cross cows per hectare (F)(/ha) with



\$3.85 farm working expenses (FWE) producing 1050 1350 Milk Solids per hectare (MS/ha). This is a tidy level of FWE and production with a low SR. Since Josh and Megan have been running the property there have been a few changes with the farms management and now the farm is running with FWE of \$4.10 producing 135 MS/ha. Milk solids are the fat and protein component within milk that dairy farmers get paid for. Milk solids are around 7-10% of milk volume depending on breed, stage of lactation and feeding. The property has a cost protection system, of a 'service and fix yourself' attitude and a predominantly self-contained feed system.

The major change that I could see was a manipulation of feed grown on farm. Growing less maize, moving from 15 ha to 9ha, and then incorporating 15ha Chicory. Chicory is being used as a biannual crop. 7.5 ha are carried through the winter with oats sown into it. This is then used as the calving area then re-sown with chicory. In March this is then undersown with permanent pasture. In December it was noted the 2 paddocks were under performing so sorghum was planted to increase the paddocks yield. What happens with this paddock after Sorghum is unknown, but maybe annuals followed by maize?

The other change, 100t of maize was carried through the winter and 200t of PKE was purchased. Now the 100t of maize is not grown but replaced with PKE. Going forward with the farms selfcontained attitude towards feed, the purchased feed would ideally be reduced markedly.

I really enjoyed the way Josh and Meghan are looking at the farm system and maximising the yield/ha with the incorporation of feed types for quality that fit the stage of lactation and time of year. This application maximises /cow production resulting in better cow condition therefore cow health and reproductive performance.

The hot and dry season has arrived even the El Nino affect has not been felt. DairyNZ has released a new calculator to help work out the profitability of milking on vs drying off part or the whole herd. Key parameters are income, expenses that are and aren't flexible on your farm with scenarios of twice a day (TAD), 16hr milking and once a day (OAD).

Ian Taylor has tried the new Flash Mate heat detection device. Ian said the device worked very well and is another tool to use. Ian had a poor mating result last year through no fault of his own. Flash Mate heat detection devices assisted Ian and his team reach a much better result this year. I have been using Flash Mate heat detection devices, available through Gallagher over the last 3 years, helping with their development and I will be continuing to use them going forward now they have been released commercially. We will be mating in Late May and throughout June if you would like to have a look.

Yellow Bristle Grass (YBG) is making itself visually apparent at the moment. It is smart to cut the seed heads off and burn them and spray the plants. YBG seeds mature on the plant at different times so if we just spray the plant some seeds will still be viable.

It is time to start thinking about regrassing. Most farmers are unhappy with how our pastures are persisting, especially on the peat. Pastures are only lasting 3 years and then are completely run out, from this point on requiring under sowing annually. I used Lush which is a Tetraploid Italian Ryegrass with AR37. I found it gave a good quality bulk of feed over winter and were the only plants still growing well in December. All pastures sown unless a winter crop within a crop rotation need to have AR37 or Nea2 endophyte to protect it from



insect pests and think seriously if considering not using super strike (SS). Please do not confuse longevity of pasture plants through drought with endophyte. Using high or wild type endophyte pastures has negative animal health effects that cannot be ignored so don't be tempted to go back there. The best way to take pressure off pastures is minimising over grazing and more importantly frequency. Modern pastures can't protect themselves from over grazing as high endophyte pastures do so we need to manage them differently. Try on off grazing using a stand-off area once they have hit target residual (how much the cows leave behind, 1500kgDM/ha) and a 40++ day rotation. For any questions on regrassing please call Calum (0272235123) from PGG Wrightsons. Calum has a wealth of knowledge supported by Emma and Kyle from PGG Wrightsons Seeds.

Fonterra Governance and Representation (FGnR) meetings are being held through February and March for Fonterra Farmers being able to have their say. In March feedback will be reviewed with a Draft proposal being released in April followed by another round of farmer meetings with a final proposal being released in May. I implore farmers to come to these meetings to hear what is being said and to have some input. Please read the booklet on FGnR to get an understanding of the different roles of Council and the Board, also committees. Note how different they are and how they work together to make the right decisions for farmers with regard to Fonterra's direction.

The Game fishing season is in full swing with largest numbers of pelagic species being caught for years. Unfortunately, even with global oil prices being at \$30, down from \$45 in December, funds for most Dairy farmers does not permit very many hours at sea to harvest the bounty!

Always remember the most important things in life are family and friends, so give them the time and effort they deserve. Don't worry about the things you can't control and get the most out of what you can!

SHOULD SHE STAY OR SHOULD SHE

Calving pattern has one of the biggest impacts on herd fertility; culling is a chance for you to influence next season's calving to maximise your herd's days in milk and reproductive performance.



1. Use your expected calvings report — But make sure it's accurate. Without early-aged pregnancy testing the expected calvings

report will only be based on last recorded matings which can make winter management decisions risky. Check when the best time to pregnancy test is with the clinic to maximise report accuracy.

- 2. ID passengers and problems High cell count and low performing cows, do you need them? Efficient, problem-free cows are essential in achieving farm profitability.
- 3. Use PW and LW If you've herd tested through the season then your PW and LW will be accurate in helping you identify your profitable girls. It's not as simple as milk solids alone; milk components and live weight need to be accounted for too.
- 4, Cull late calvers Late calving cows have fewer days in milk, fewer AB replacements and generally poorer fertility in the following mating. They'd need to be a well above average cow to make up for it! Do you want or need to keep all of them?
- 5. Meet young stock targets Managing calving pattern starts at birth. Animals that hit live weight targets are more likely to calve down early, produce more milk, and are more likely to remain early calving.
- 6. Monitor condition Meeting body condition score (BCS) targets at calving drives good reproduction. Cows need feed and time to meet these targets so resist the temptation to milk them on and make sure they are dried off on BCS and expected calving date so they can make target.

Use the opportunity culling provides to influence your calving pattern next spring. Call the clinic and we'll help you get the most from your reports with early-aged pregnancy testing. NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Well another year is well underway and as I write this article welcome rain is falling — a temporary relief for us, and our animals, from the intense heat.

I have noted the undulating and rough surface on the Holland Road end of Eureka Road and have asked our Roading Manager for a maintenance schedule for this work. He advises that, because of the lengthy list of rehab for the District for the 16/17 financial year (together with the carryover from 15/16), remedial work will be done based on safety with rehab done over the next two financial years. The contractor will do some reshaping and smoothing treatment to this section of Eureka Road in late March this year with rehabilitation programmed for the 2017/18 financial

We are putting together a Freedom camping bylaw. At present we do not have a bylaw to cover this and you will have noticed the large numbers of campervans travelling through our district. The new bylaw will give clear guidance to those with self contained campervans and caravans where they can park overnight. The bylaw has been drafted and will be considered by Council in April 2016 and will then be put out for submission. I would be interested in hearing your thoughts on this bylaw. Other bylaws are being reviewed this year and include — the road naming policy, land acquisition criteria, unformed legal roads — decision making framework, annual renewal of bridge restrictions, review of roadside fencing policy and proposed WDC Trade Waste and Wastewater Bylaw 2016.

The first sod will be turned on 11 March for the Hamilton section of the Expressway so work will soon be well underway. As you will be aware the Cambridge Expressway opened in December and I am told it is removing up to 19,000 cars per day from the local Cambridge roads.

The District has moved to a Level 2 water alert and Waikato District is now in a Restricted Fire Season. Because of the extreme dryness to date no fire permits are being issued. You can contact Council for more information on 0800 492 452 Water concerns for Hamilton, Waikato and Waipa can be reported to wvqm.smartwater.org.nz/water-concernform If you are connected to the Southern District Water Scheme I suggest you check your pipes and tanks regularly for leaks to conserve water and save yourself from a nasty surprise when you receive your water bill.

District Plan on line — by going onto Councils on-line website and pressing maps online on the home page you can view details of any property in the district including the road boundaries, property and rating information, District Plan information, utilities information etc. Follow the instructions and type in a property address or property assessment number to search for information on the property you wish to view. Going forward we will be improving the site regularly to give enquirers more information and easier assess.

To enable us to better understand the risk of tsunamis for our communities on the west coast - Port Waikato, Raglan Harbour and Aotea Harbour, and to provide valuable information for Civil Defence Emergency Management we have jointly funded a West Coast Tsunami Study with Waikato Regional Council and WEL Energy. We have now received the report findings that will be presented to the Onewhero/Tuakau and Raglan Community Boards in early March before a media release on the report is released to the public.

A cycling ring around Auckland's CBD is a step closer with the design of one of the final stages recently released. It will form part of a circular route around the inner city mostly separated from traffic and pedestrians. A future Karangahape Rd cycleway will complete the city loop. Construction begins in early March and Auckland Transport aims to complete the project by late May before works begin on the City Rail Link in the downtown area. Perhaps the city will follow the lead of many UK and European cities that have bicycles in docking stations around the city. In London the "Boris bikes" (after Mayor Boris Johnson) are available to hire at one of the 750 docking stations in the city. It costs E2 to access a bike using a bank card and the first 30 minutes are free. If you aren't using the bike you dock it and then pick up another one at another docking station. A similar system in Auckland, and other NZ cities, would be a great way

to see a city without the hassle of parking your car in the inner city.
