### Eureka Express Guest Editorial

Introducing ourselves, Percy and Linda Sharp, to the Eureka community after having been here for almost 10 years is a bit overdue, but better late than never.

Originally from Zimbabwe, circumstance almost forced us to leave our wonderful home country and relocate to New Zealand in 2003. Our three children, Tommy (36), Nicola (34) and Steve (29) had started fleeing the nest and two were already living outside Zimbabwe as the opportunities there were no longer attractive or adequate. We decided to move somewhere where they might be enticed to join us. I felt we had to stay in the southern

hemisphere and thankfully our New Zealand applications materialised before those in Australia. Our plan has worked and we now have Tommy and his partner Sonay with their daughters Linita(5) and Kayleigh(4) living in Auckland. Nicky and her husband lain, daughter Maddyson(3) and a baby boy due on I<sup>st</sup> April live here in Hamilton. Steve and fiancé Becky also live here in Hamilton.

Being a veterinarian, I was fortunate enough to have a pre-arranged job as a MAF vet at a meatworks in New Plymouth. We spent 2 and a half years there and then moved to Hamilton in 2005 to revert to the field of veterinary science that I had specialised in, namely embryo transfer. Since September 2006 we have established a small IVF embryo transfer centre here at 590 Holland Road and do work for predominantly dairy farmers throughout the North Island.

Looking after 12 acres keeps us occupied but our pasture management probably has neigbours doubting our methods. 25 years' involvement in the Holistic Management movement dictates what I do and the highlight of my day is going out to move our small Wagyu herd to their next strip of gazing. Four pure bred Wagyu calves, imported from Australia as embryos, have just been born and are a valuable addition to the other half-bred Wagyu cattle that we run. The aim of being able to grow adequate cattle fodder without using any chemical inputs or having to preserve fodder in any form has been achieved. Our 2-3 month July/August lake has also disappeared. healthy land.

One of the major changes we have experienced between living in New Zealand compared to Zimbabwe, is the huge reduction in the level of anxiety we are exposed to with respect to our safety from crime and violence. For the last 35 years that we lived and dairy farmed in Rhodesia/Zimbabwe through the 15-year liberation war and the violent farm evictions, we slept in locked, security fenced and burglar-barred homes, constantly on the alert for any threatening noise or dog barking. We have even got used to the gunfire from the gun club just down the road from us. It is comforting to know that when one of our possessions can't be found, we have just forgotten where we put it and it has not been stolen.

A difficult adjustment for us was having to start life over again at 50 and living in a country where we were strangers and spoke with an accent. Coming from a community where my great-grandfather moved onto our farm in 1909, I was used to going to town and meeting people whose grandfather knew my grandfather. Thankfully we now occasionally bump into people we know and appreciate that we feel people are now starting to trust us. I am having trouble getting Linda to support the All Blacks. I am slowly getting round to being a supporter especially when they play against Australia, but as most young Rhodesians aspired to becoming Springboks, I still find it difficult when the All Blacks play South Africa.

We would like to extend our thanks to Graeme and Colleen, Karl and Sally and Robbie, our neighbours when we arrived in Eureka, for helping us settle in and for their on-going friendship. Colin at Eureka Motors has also been most friendly and helpful. Thank you also to all the Kiwi farmers who provide us with a livelihood.

We have no plans of leaving the district soon, so we hope to get to know a lot more of you.

### MORE ON THE RABBIT PROBLEM

Well the rabbit meeting I wrote about last month was duly held at the Hall, and a very satisfying 19 people turned up to hear Chris Monk of the Regional Council talk about responsibilities and methods of extermination, with slides to show what to do.

With the proliferation of lifestyle blocks, and animals everywhere, Chris warned that guns might not be the first or best choice of method. Horses, in particular, can be terrified by gunfire, and can do themselves, or their fences, considerable damage. Not only that, but someone has to have the requisite licence to shoot. Shotguns are very noisy but useful at close range, while .22 rifles, while quieter, have a much longer range and you need to aim very carefully.

So quite a bit of Eureka probably isn't gun country these days.

Chris talked about Pindone, a rabbit poison, but warned that it could only be used in bait stations, and definitely not spread on paddocks unless the person spreading it had a Controlled Substance Licence, and permission from the Medical Officer of Health. It only seems to come in biggish containers and costs \$100 or so.

That left the fumigant Magtoxin, which can be bought from Farmlands and other stock agents. It's about \$50 for a small container of pellets (about 160), and comes with instructions. I sold half my container to my neighbour, but mistakenly put my share in a glass jam jar with lid. Chris warned that sunlight on glass will cause the fumigant to start coming out, and it must be kept in the dark and preferably in the original metal container.

My family came for Easter and we did a group exercise in rabbit extermination on my one hectare with Magtoxin. First we walked all over the paddocks and marked all the likely warren holes which were deep enough to be being used. Then we fetched the pellets, a spoon, a spade and a wheelbarrow of soil and donkey doo (of which I had piles). The process works best when there is moisture around, which starts the pellets off. Saturday was rather humid and we'd had some rain, so the soil was damp too.

I threw two pellets down each hole with the spoon (the recommended dose), and then the family shovelled and stamped and filled each hole solidly. Even putting the cap back on the jar very quickly each time I found that the fumes were getting to me by the time we did the last holes, so be warned not to lean over the open jar/tin.

Since then none of the holes has been excavated, we have seen one or two rather 'lost' rabbits the next day, and there were two on my drive which probably came from next door, but haven't returned. So make sure your neighbours are also making efforts at extermination, or all the effort will be for naught!

There was talk at the end of the meeting that if the whole district got together, they could negotiate a discount on Pindone with the manufacturers. But it would need a biggish group, a number of bait stations, or some legal and medical permissions for wider spreading. I'll be sticking to Magtoxin in the meantime.



### COWS IN MORRINSVILLE

Sometime ago I wrote enthusiastically about Eureka being represented with a painted cow in the streets of Morrinsville.

Well I spent three whole months painting it, and the big crowd at the official launch loved it, and the Gallery people were looking forward to having her outside.

However, my sponsor and his wife, both avid football fans, but no art lovers, were obviously expecting an 'emblem' Mooloo, rather than an art work.82871983

They decided the black wasn't black enough, the eyes were wrong, and some of the lines weren't straight enough for them. Also the sides, which were a greeny grey decorated with footballers, weren't green enough.

So they took it to a car painter, had it completely resprayed, removed the small decorative touches, and painted the sides bright emerald green. Not only that, but the football figures were photographed, turned into stickers, and stuck on.

When I heard she was being 'touched up' I rang the Cow Committee and asked that my name be removed from any association with that cow, and suggested that a spray painted, stickered cow was hardly appropriate outside an art gallery.

However, money obviously won out and she eventually appeared, quite different from her original look.

Lately I have learned that the original plaque with my name on it as painter has been attached to the base. I have therefore demanded that it be removed forthwith. We await developments. What you will see outside the gallery is a travesty of the original. I apologise if people in Eureka feel let down, but I and my Morrinsville and gallery friends have been devastated. I'd always been told that long term Morrinsville residents had no taste for art (it took 5 years to get the gallery open), and this would seem to prove it. I've attached a photo of the original (even if not in colour) so you can see what we lost.

### Fresh Fig Cake

This recipe makes a moist cake filled with a mixture of fresh figs, brown sugar, and lemon juice.

Ingredients

Directions

- 1/4 cup butter, softened
  I cup white sugar
  I egg
  2 cups all-purpose flour
  1/2 teaspoon salt
  2 teaspoons baking powder
  1 cup evaporated milk
- I teaspoon vanilla extract 1/4 teaspoon almond extract I cup chopped fresh figs 1/4 cup packed brown sugar 1/4 cup water 2 cups chopped fresh figs I tablespoon lemon juice



- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Spray two 8-inch round cake pans with vegetable Oil spray.
- 2. In a medium bowl, sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Set aside.
- **3.** In a large mixing bowl, cream butter with the sugar until fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Add flour mixture alternately with the evaporated milk. Fold in vanilla and almond extracts and chopped figs.
- 4. Divide into two prepared 8 inch round cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 30 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out dry.

To make the filling: In a saucepan, combine 2 cups figs, brown sugar, water and lemon juice. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to a simmer and cook until thickened, about 20 minutes. Spread thinly between layers of cake and on top.

### Gluten-free Chocolate and Almond Brownie

A fabulous, easy to make, brownie that everyone can enjoy!

#### Ingredients

200 g Butter

3 tsp Vanilla extract 4 Eggs

1 cup Dutch cocoa powder% tsp Baking powder, gluten freeh tsp Salt1% cups Rice flour

Ih cups Caster sugar

% cup Slivered almonds h cup Dark chocolate, chopped, plus an extra half a cup to add after baking 1 serving Cream, softly whipped Directions



I. Preheat oven to 180C.

- 2. Melt the butter in a saucepan then stir in the sugar and vanilla. Remove from the heat and whisk in the eggs, one at a time.
- 3. Sift the cocoa, baking powder, salt and rice flour together.
- 4. Add to the egg and butter mixture with the almonds and chocolate.
- 5. Pour into the prepared slice tin and bake for 20-25 minutes or until the centre is slightly firm to the touch.
- 6. Let cool before slicing and topping with slivers of chocolate. Serve with cream

### NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR



I am receiving a number of calls around the appearance of a pest plant Yellow Bristle Grass on our roadsides. This summer-growing weed is now flowering and is a significant threat to pasture quality on adjoining farms. AgResearch's advice for farmers is - to top it, spray it or make silage out Of it but don't make hay. On roadsides it can be topped but ensure the mown grass isn't spat into the paddock and be careful to clean your mower so the seeds don't spread to other areas. I am notifying staff of areas of infestation and they are arranging for our contractors Alliance to spray the affected areas. Thus far I have been advised of affected areas in Eureka and Tauwhare — let me know if it is in your road. Yellow bristle grass is an upright annual-seeding plant growing 25-45cm high. The yellow seed head is a cylindrical 'spike' 2.5-10cm long.

The Eureka / Tamahere Wards Heritage Committee is still meeting monthly and we plan to meet in different venues around the Wards to enable more residents to participate. I will let you know when we are meeting in Eureka so you can bring along items of history (documents, photographs etc) that you would like scanned and archived. We already have a domain name set up to <sup>V</sup>drop in' items of history for each of the districts — Eureka, Matangi, Tauwhare, Puketaha, Newstead, Gordonton, and Tamahere.

Council is getting closer to finalising a plan to relocate the Huntly Museum. Eventually this Museum Will have a role in archiving Waikato District history but until this happens it is important that local documentation is preserved.

An Open Fire season came in to effect at midnight on 21 March until further notice, During an open fire season permits are not required unless the fire is within a Ikm margin of a DOC area in which case a fire permit from DOC is required.

Work on our network of 2,422km of roads is now managed by a partnership between Council and Downers. This Alliance does work ranging from routine maintenance and assessment, roadside mowing and weed control etc through to construction of roads and drainage. So far this partnership has been very successful. The Alliance will shortly be moving out of the Council building to the Strada building in Ngaruawahia with Strada probably moving to Huntly.

As I mentioned in last month's Express the turning of the first sod of the Hamilton Section of the Expressway was held on 11 March and was attended by the Prime Minister and Minister of Transport. This 21.8km section will cost \$973m and is due to be completed by 2020. It includes 17 bridges, five interchanges and cycling and walking paths, will use 28,450 cubic metres of concrete, 212km of road markings and 126km of fencing and it is estimated the project will require up to 4 million cubic metres of earthworks and 1.3m tonnes of aggregate. This project will have quite an effect in some areas in the Eureka Ward. There will be extensive "greenfield" work and a bridge is to be built across Puketaha Road, an interchange at the Ruakura Road/SH26 intersection and an interchange at Greenhill Road. Ruakura Road will be stopped just beyond Ruakura Motors and redirected to feed into the Ruakura Interchange.

This month I attended the quarterly meeting of the Hauraki Guff Forum, at which I represent Waikato District. I find the information we are given at these meetings is very extensive and informative and the work being done to preserve the environment in the Gulf is a credit to those involved. At the March meeting we received a report from IFAW (International Fund for Animal welfare) and it was interesting to learn that, between June 2014 and Dec 2015, as the average mean speed of all vessels in the Gulf fell from 12kts to 10.8kts the risk of whale fatality trend also fell. we also heard that monitoring at Goat Island Marine Reserve shows that, although during the 1990's the numbers of crayfish increased four-fold and snapper were noticeably bigger and more common, numbers of crayfish and snapper are lower now than when the reserve was established in 1975. This monitoring suggests fishing pressure on the offshore boundary of the reserve for crayfish is so intense that animals that stray outside it are being caught faster than they are able to recruit back into the reserve. This shows the need for greater integration between fisheries management and marine protection and Government's proposed reform of marine protected areas legislation, its review of the fisheries management system and the current investment in the Sea Change Tai Tirnu Tai Pari marine spatial planning process creates an opportunity to do this.

Planning for further sections of the Te Awa River Ride is progressing with the designs for the bridge on the Ngaruawahia to Horotiu section underway. Plans are also progressing for the Hamilton to Cambridge section. The Perry Bike Park will be opening soon with direct access from Te Awa's Horotiu section. Te Awa River Ride have teamed up with Hamilton Gardens and Novotel Hamilton Tainui to offer a range of new bikes for hire — full day and half day hire is available which includes helmets and bike locks and the bikes are available from both locations.
