

RAINFALL: After record rainfall in March we await with interest the April total as more records could be broken after Cyclone's Debbie and Cook did their worst. Since 1994 the tallies kept by Jack Hooper show a maximum March rainfall of 152mm and March average for the last 23 years of 69.9mm. That was certainly exceeded this year. April maximum was 186mm and average of 95mm!!



## TASTE BUDS

## JAMIE OLIVER'S TOSSET CAKE Makes 25

500g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

150g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling

500g unsalted butter, softened

I heaped teaspoon caraway seeds

1 heaped teaspoon coriander seeds

Icing sugar, for decorating

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/gas 4.

Sieve the flour and sugar into a large bowl, then rub in the butter. Lightly crush the seeds in a pestle and mortar, then add to the bowl. Stir the mixture so it comes together to form a dough, bringing it together to make a ball, then wrap in cling film and place in the fridge to rest for around 1 hour.

Roll out the dough on a flour-dusted surface to roughly ½cm thick, then stamp out circles with a 6cm pastry cutter. Place the dough circles onto a flour-dusted baking tray and sprinkle with a little sugar. Pop in the hot oven for 10 to 15 minutes, or until firm (you want them to be a nice pale colour, rather than golden). Transfer to a wire cooling rack to cool completely, then dust with icing sugar and serve.

## COUNTDOWN'S CHICKEN AND LEEK PIE

It's awesome, I get asked for it all the time. Thank you Countdown.

20g butter

2 cloves garlic, crushed

1 large leek, sliced lengthwise then chopped 1 carrot, grated

a i carrot, grated

½ tsp dried tarragon

½ tsp wholegrain mustard 1 ½ cups chicken stock

20g flour Salt and pepper to taste

400g chicken breast, cooked and shredded

50g grated tasty cheese

400g Signature Range flaky puff pastry

1 egg, beaten with 1 Thsp water

#### Method

Melt butter in a medium sized pot. Add garlie, leek and carrot. Cook on low heat covered. Cook vegetables until soft, but not browned. Add tarragon, mustard and stir. Add flour, stir and cook for 2 minutes. Slowly add chicken stock, stirring until it has thickened. Season with salt and pepper. Set aside to cool.

Add chicken and stir through.

Preheat oven to 200°C.

On a lightly floured board, roll ¾ of the pastry to fit a 20cm pie dish. Line the tin and leave the excess hanging over. Roll the remainder of the pastry to fit the top.

Spoon your filling mixture into the pie tin and sprinkle over the cheese. Brush the edges of the pastry with beaten egg and place on the top pressing the edges together. Brush the top with remaining egg. Bake for 40 minutes until pastry is puffed and golden.

Tip: This pie is also fabulous with a potato topping. Replace the top with mashed potato and sprinkle over cheese.

## IN YOUR GARDEN

Hi Folks,

The weather has been devastating for hundreds of people and farmers all over the country. This has to be the worst year for the amount of rain around the country for many years.

Farmers are getting a bad name called "dirty dairying" I have just read recently that scientists have proved that wild fowl on lakes and water ways excrete 6.5 times more e-coli into water ways than one cow.

Winter veges should be planted now. That includes broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, kale, spinach, some lettuce varieties, parsley, garden peas, silverbeet and beetroot etc.

All the above will grow in cooler weather but growth will slow when the temperature drops.

If you are looking to transport roses, fruit trees and plants that have got too large, June is a good time to do this. Dig around the plant to be shifted at least 40cm from the base of the plant. Lift plant out keeping as much soil as possible around the roots. Have a large hole dug ready and replant your plant. Pat in firmly Do not add fertiliser in the hole - do this on top of the ground away from the main steam of the plant.

Now is the time to order your plant requirements for planting this winter.

These include all trees, roses, fruiting trees etc.

### MEDIA RELEASE: CHECK THIS MONTH'S POWER ACCOUNT FOR YOUR WEL NETWORKS DISCOUNT

WEL Networks is reminding its customers to check their April or May power account to ensure they receive this year's discount.

Over the past 15 years WEL Networks has distributed \$293 million (including GST) in savings to the Waikato community and this year they're paying a total of \$20 million (including GST) to WEL Networks customers.

Chief Executive, Garth Dibley, explains "As part of WEL's commitment to the region's growth, we're constantly looking for ways to reduce the cost of electricity to the people and businesses of the Waikato. One of our major initiatives is the WEL Discount programme which gives all WEL customer's in the Waikato network area a share of our success."

To receive the discount customers must be connected to WEL Networks at 5pm, 31 March 2017.

"Customers receive the discount for each Installation Control Point (ICP) or unique point of connection. The discount amount will show as a credit on your April or May power account, regardless of which retailer you purchase your electricity from.

"The actual amount of the discount will depend on how much electricity customers have used over the past 12 months so it's likely to vary between neighbours and addresses."

Mr Dibley says if customers can't see the discount applied as a credit on their April or May power account they should contact their power retailer in the first instance.

"If there is an issue or query about their discount customers must contact WEL Networks by Friday 30 June."

#### Trees and Power lines don't mix

Did you know ...?

- As a property owner, you are responsible for trees inside your property and the WEL.
   Networks team takes care of everything else outside the boundary.
- Trees and vegetation growing near power lines cause a fifth of unplanned outages to power supply. They can also put the safety and security of the wider lines network at risk.
- Even when trees appear to be well clear of the lines they still pose a threat to the power supply during storms and strong winds.
- Always stay away from downed power lines and don't approach, or remove vegetation or objects caught in lines.

# DairyNZ CO COMMENT FOR EUREKA EXPRESS

Wet, wet wet

What an unusual March/April. We have been so programmed to expect 2-3 months of really dry weather that getting half our annual rainfall, in 60 days of late Summer early Autumn, comes as a bit of a shock. You can have too much of a good thing! It was looking to be quite different. If the dry in mid February had continued we were shaping up to be one of the driest periods in about 50 years.

Fertiliser companies have mentioned that recent soil tests have revealed sulphur levels that you would expect at the end of a wet winter rather than the start. Bear this in mind when putting nitrogen on this Autumn. You may well need to ensure some readily available Sulphur is in the mix also.

#### Brett & Rachel Gordon on the move:

Brett & Rachel move from Waverley Road, Eureka to their farm at Bucklands Road Matamata at the end of the season. It is timely to recognise the many years Brett has put in as Convener of the Eureka Dairy Discussion Group. Come along on Tuesday May 9 to Brett & Rachel's farm on Waverley Road where they will host the discussion group and you will have a chance to say thank you for their efforts on behalf of the group.

#### Jaimee Morgan:

Consulting Officer, Jaimee remains on official paternity leave until 12 June. Young Cooper is progressing well. However, Jaimee is going to run her usual groups in May but only on a casual basis.

#### Milk Price Futures:

I don't know how many of you follow the milk price futures market. This is where you can lock in a price for some of your production. The contracts for the 17/18 season have ranged from \$5:55 to \$6:30. For the week ending April 21st the contract was at \$6:28/kg MS indicating a reasonably positive outlook for dairy. As we know though milk price can be fickle so take advice about whether this risk management tool is for you before entering into such a contract.


#### Waikato Farmers Forum:

### **Body Condition Scores**



As autumn approaches and the time for drying off the herd comes closer, it is important to consider your herds **Body Condition Score** (BCS).

The more cows you have calving at 5.00 and the more 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> calvers you have calving at 5.5, the better your herds milk production will be and the more cows you will get in calf at mating time.

Young cows are still growing to reach their mature weight and usually don't eat as much. Often they are also losing their baby teeth and this affects their ability to graze efficiently. Typically, they are also at the bottom of the pecking order, so often don't get the best feed available. These animals need to be looked after! This could mean once a day milking




maybe sooner than the rest of the herd, preferential feeding, and dry off early.

So the table above shows that a cow with condition score 3 will need an extra 160 kg DM of autumn pasture to be fed over 120 days to get to calving condition score 5.

#### Heifers

Aim to have these at BCS 5.5 when they return from grazing, as they will put little weight on (and often lose weight) while they adapt to being in the herd. Have a plan to keep them separate from the adult herd if possible.

## NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR



It is hard to believe we are into the second quarter of 2017. Eureka Ward has had its fair share of flooding during the last few storms and the sodden ground is having an affect on cropping on the Ward's mainly flat terrain. It must be many years since we have had so much autumn rain because my sons have only a vague recollection of tractors and combines sinking in the peat – something I remember well from when we bought our farm in the 70's...

Council staff worked long hours to remedy road and infrastructure storm damage around the district and during the storms we received daily updates on this from our civil defence staff.. Many hot dry summers, and now flooding, are causing endless problems with road sinkage and seal breakup. I am aware that a large number of roads in my Ward need reshaping and

rehabilitation but, with 2,364 kilometres (km) of roading in the District, I have to compete for roading funds. I drive around the Ward on a regular basis to identify any infrastructure problems but let me know if you have noticed any road subsidence or cracking in your area; also contact me if you have experienced any problems with council drains on your road or property during the storms so we can investigate.

The storms have caused significant damage to the Hakarimata Summit Track at Ngaruawahia resulting in its closure until the repairs are completed. DOC has reported that The track has fallen away in at least three places and there has been significant movement of one stairway section away from the hillside towards the adjacent stream. We know from experience that will be no quick fix for this stort of damage. Around 200,000 people used the track in the last year. DOC also wish to remind visitors that the popular Kauri Loop Track just a few kms down the road at the Huntly end of the Hakarimata Range is still open. Other walking tracks in the district include the Pukemokemoke Bush Loop Track – 5 mins from Gordonton (take the Whitikahu Road turnoff and look out for the sign on the left hand side). For a more challenging walk try the Karioi Track and Wairake track near Raglan which both end up at the Mt Karioi Summit – it takes between 2 – 3.5 hours to reach the summit.

Last month in my newsletter I mentioned that, as part of our Annual Plan (Budget) process, we held an Extraordinary Council meeting in Feb to approve the Annual Plan 2017/2018 Consultation Document and proposed amendments to fees and charges. The Annual Plan is our budget and explains how Council will fund projects, services etc for this financial year. This year we are consulting with ratepayers on rating for wastewater systems. This will involve consulting with around 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of our ratepayers who benefit from reticulated wastewater services – if you have a septic tank and DO NOT pay a wastewater rate this will not affect you.

We are not consulting on any other part of the AP as there are no other significant changes to the works programme but we will engage about projects in Eureka Ward as they begin – key projects for 2017-18 include 1,016km of road rehabilitation, 8.01 km of road re-seal and the installation of a reservoir to meet future growth needs for water. We are currently securing a site for the reservoir.

The inorganic refuse collection will begin in May. In a change from the planned service, in 2017 inorganic rubbish will again be collected from the kerbsite outside properties. The pickups will take place over four weeks beginning 1 May – the week for your collection is dependent on your normal recycling collection day. #### THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT BURGLARY

#### WHO burgles a house?

- · A burglar can be male or female of any age, height, size, colour or race;
- They may operate alone, in pairs or in groups;
- They may be on foot or could use a vehicle, motor bike or bicycle to check out your neighbourhood;

#### WHEN do burglars strike?

- They burgle houses by day and night, come rain or shine especially when they can see no one's home or the
  risk of being seen, or caught is low;
- · They often burgle one or more nearby houses in the neighbourhood.
- . They often return to a burgled house a few weeks or months later when the stolen items have been replaced.

#### WHERE do burglars pick their victims?

- The house looks empty, like there's no one home lights aren't on at night, curtains may be closed during the
  day, or mail and newspapers have been left to accumulate in the letterbox. The phone keeps ringing instead
  of going straight to answerphone: no one home!
- Names on rural letterboxes which enable burglars to ring the telephone number and check if anyone is at home!
- Some windows or doors open or unsecured, for the cat and dog, or just like people used to in the "good old days";
- The house is not easily visible from the street, there are lots of trees and shrubs to hide the burglars from those nosey neighbours;
- The house is conveniently situated next to an alleyway, park or reserve so they can get into and out of the house as quickly and quietly as possible;
- Items of value are left outside to be stolen: bikes, copper plant pots for example;
- · A television glowing in clear view from the street;
- Garage door left open too, so it can be seen that the car isn't there and the lawnmower and chainsaw are up for grabs!
- If they've been to the house before they will know the layout pretty well.

#### WHY DO BURGLARS STEAL?

- They want cash, and small valuable items like jewellery, electronic and portable digital equipment, alcohol, and tobacco which can be quickly converted into cash or drugs;
- Whatever is on their "shopping list" which is often kept in the "getaway car". Remember burglars earn their living doing this!

#### WHAT PUTS A BURGLAR OFF?

- Houses with alarms. Especially properly installed alarms which are <u>always</u> armed <u>whenever</u> the occupier goes out no matter how long for;
- Houses with security lighting, especially the kind that is set up properly and which works;
- Neighbourhood Support signs and stickers; suspicious, enquiring neighbours; people who challenge them; people who call the Police;
- · Dogs. Or guard dog signs on fences and gates;
- Houses with good, solid, locked, locks and doors, windows and other entry points.
- A vehicle in the driveway;
- Lights, TV and radio are on:
- People who advertise that they are using SNAP and SelectaDNA.

#### REPORTING A CRASH CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE:

Autumn is a time of year when driving conditions can vary and as the cooler, wetter weather sets in, it becomes even more crucial to take care out there on the roads. But if there is a crash on our roads, Waikato District Council's website has a tool which the public can use to play a part in ensuring that the roads and roadside conditions are maintained at a high level.

Council's crash reporting form can be used to inform our staff of minor, non-injury crashes that may have resulted in damage to roads or roadsides to the extent where an urgent repair would be needed to ensure other road users' safety isn't compromised.

Completed forms can also help to identify any issues on Council's roading network that might need looking at. For example, if there were a number of crashes in one area or on one piece of road, then Council may need to look at the road conditions at that site.

New Zealand Police inform Council of more significant crashes around the time they occur and staff assess any road damage as part of that process, as required.

If a member of the public comes across a crash that hasn't resulted in an injury, the details needed on the form include: a description of where and when the accident occurred; a description of what happened; road and weather conditions; objects that were struck (for example fence posts, road signs or other vehicles) and a diagram of the incident.

Waikato District Council road safety co-ordinator Megan Jolly says it is important the Council knows where crashes are occurring on its road network.

"Local residents' knowledge of non-injury crashes along with police reports of serious injury crashes gives us a clearer picture of where and when repairs need to be carried out. In some instances, the details provided by the public may also highlight factors that require additional investigation by Council staff" she says.
