

Another one bites the dust...

THE IRVINE YEARS IN EUREKA. June 1972 – July 2017

Arriving in Eureka on a cold bleak May morning, with Brent, our first son, who was only one-month old, I wondered what we had done! I had loved the house and surroundings when I viewed it but it was all finalised while I was learning how to be a mum in Campbell Johnston, as it was then called (Waikato Women's birthing unit) It was all a little overwhelming. However, a month after our arrival was the "Welcome Dinner" where we enjoyed the first hospitality of Eureka, and which was just the start of many more enjoyable "welcome dinners" and Balls. Lots of fun and memories provided by this simple country hall. Gradually things changed as spring arrived. I took my beautiful baby down to the local store which was situated on the corner of Eureka Rd and State Highway 26. It has since been converted to a beautiful home but in those days it was owned by Joe and Noeline Stockman, who owned the garage. A very good place to gather for chats and the buying of bread and milk. Summer saw us spending many happy hours at the local school swimming pool. Chris worked in town so it was enjoyable to have company. Guy, our second son arrived in 1975 and Matangi Playcentre played a large part in our lives.

School days saw working bees, where the whole district showed up and the day finished by a large combined barbeque. We had an amazing headmaster, Roger Moltzen, who was an absolute asset to the school. He was strongly supported by Mrs Russel (infants) and Mrs Bailie (older children – Standard 1 and 2) and Roger was with the oldest group (Standard 3 and 4.) Our children received such a strong and comprehensive education. How lucky they were. Obviously, class numbers were low so each got plenty of attention. Calf club saw lambs and then goats trained (??? Two days before calf club often!!) to lead beautifully. Socialising was done with the local neighbours, some whose friendships I still enjoy. We had an old Falcon wagon and at the end of the evening, the boys would be popped to bed on mattresses and sleeping bags in the back of the wagon, and the adults would continue to enjoy the evening. Not sure what Health and Safety would think of that these days but the boys thought of it as a real adventure. We also used this wagon to transport the whole rugby team from Eureka, to the venue of their match. All sitting happily in the back, with no seat belts!!!! And then back to our house for sausages, bread and tomato sauce. It was a very happy place to bring up our young children.

The development of the Eureka Express, which played a large part in my life, still seems to play an important role in the district. I know a lot of districts are envious of this little newspaper, which celebrates achievements, births, marriages and recognition of those leaving and those arriving.

Then came Intermediate, High school and then work and university. Unfortunately, this started the changes for us in Eureka and we tended to spend more time in town. Marriages arrived and while Brent chose his bride from Hamilton, Guy chose Anna Hinton, so links with the district will always be strong.



Now 45 years later, with a heavy heart, I write this editorial. What a happy life we spent in Eureka. We move on with our lives and different stages have different requirements. I am very sad to be leaving and while it is the right decision a little part of my heart will always stay in Eureka. Do take time to enjoy this amazing community.

Your local hall, the Eureka Community Centre as it is officially known, is always available for hire and you are encouraged to use it for meetings, functions - including weddings, birthday or anniversary celebrations, luncheons, dinners or any other gathering you may be considering.

- Leave your bin or bag as close as you can to the kerbside, clear of the footpath and clear of other bins.
- Place your bin or bag away from signs, lamp posts and trees. Make sure your bag is not
 overfull and that your bag is safe to carry.
- Place your bin or bag out by 7.30am on your usual collection day. Remember to check www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz for public holiday changes.
- Remember if you don't put your refuse and recycling out right, it may not be collected.
- Wrap any broken glass or sharp objects thoroughly before putting them in the refuse bag.
- Place a pre-paid sticker on each refuse bag.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Is there a limit to the number of refuse bags I can have collected?

There is no limit as long as each bag has its own clearly displayed pre-paid sticker. 20kg is the maximum bag weight or 60 litres in size. From 1 July, any bag can be used e.g. calf meal sack, a dog biscuit bag, a black sack from the supermarket or a reusable plastic bag.

2. What can I put in the recycling crates?

You can put rinsed glass, plastic 1, 2 and 5, aluminum and cans. Cardboard and paper must be contained in a bag or a box or tied up with string and placed beside your crate.

3. Are pizza boxes recyclable?

If they are empty with no left over pizza or crust, they can be put out for recycling.

4. What happens if I put something in my recycling that is not recyclable?

It will be left in your recycling crate (for you to put in your refuse bag) with a sticker attached and the reason for non-collection.

5. Can I put my cardboard out without a bag for collection?

We recommend putting it in a box, bag or tying it with string. Keeping it contained means it doesn't get blown around the road.

6. What if refuse is dumped on the kerbside in front of my property?

Contact us on 07 824 8633 or 0800 492 452 and report any details you may have such as vehicle registration plate details, descriptions or photographs and we will take it from there.

7. Why should I squash plastic containers?

Squashed plastic bottles are less likely to blow around in the wind.

8. Do I need to remove the lids from bottles?

No, there is no need to remove the lids.



All clean soft plastics i.e. bread bags, biscuit wrap, frozen veg bags, pasta and rice bags, courier envelopes and single use plastic bags can be taken to some New World, Pak n Save and Countdown supermarkets. Check for the big bin at your nearest supermarket.





IN YOUR GARDEN

Standard or tree roses

Standard roses, or tree roses as they are also known, make delightful additions to many gardens. This rose variety is grafted onto tall rose stock (typically 80-90cm) that produce a single-trunk plant with a ball of abundant blooms on the top. Choose a standard rose if a decorative, rather than formal effect, is needed. These roses can be used to add colour and height to your garden and also make superb centrepieces.



Climbing roses



Climbing roses are extremely versatile and can be easily trained to climb across fences and walls. They also look beautiful wrapped around pillars, pergolas and ropes. Choose old fashioned climbing roses if vibrant blossoms and a heady fragrance appeal to you.

Typically, climbing roses are parented by the standard rose types of floribunda, hybrid tea and grandiflora – with their colours, and blooming habits each being replicated in their climbing versions.

Training a climbing rose is an important part of creating a stunning, heavily blooming rose. If you allow a climbing rose to grow vertically, you have fewer shoots resulting in fewer flowers. Instead, train the main stems horizontally along a trellis or fence. Remember to provide good support for climbing roses as they are heavy plants, when in full bloom.

Patio roses

Due to their small size, patio roses are typically bought with the intention of placing them in containers and pots. These roses are compact and grow between 45cm – 60cm. Potio roses will flower all summer gifting you with a fabulous display of colour. You don't need to confine patio roses to pots as they are quite hardy and can do very well in the garden, particularly in smaller area and for borders. Patio roses offer a light, pleasant fragrance.

TASTE BUDS

It's A Fishy One

2 cups chopped onions

1 tbs oil

1 tsp chilli

3 anchovies 1 tbs chopped garlic Zest and juice of a large lemon

Combine in a slow cooker until well soft and cooked. Add 1 can of coconut cream and bring up to simmer.

500 g of a firm fish, I used "Ling" but any firm fleshed fish is fine.

Cut fish into bite sized pieces, pop into cooker. Cook for ½ an hour, and check the spices and add salt and lemon pepper, parsley and a cup of prawns, cook for a further ½ hour. Serve with either rice or couscous.

WASTE NOT WANT NOT BROCCOLI PESTO

Supermarket Broccoli is trimmed to within an inch of its life....Farmers Markets or home grown have plenty of stalk and leaves attached, so here is a healthy recipe to use it up rather than bin it.

1 Stalk, stems and leaves of a head of Broccoli

1 Clove of Garlic, crushed with 1/2 tsp flaky sea salt


½ cup walnuts

CHANGES I HAVE SEEN.....

As our 50th Wedding Anniversary approached in June I had been thinking back to my impressions of Eureka in 1967 when I arrived as a new bride. It was a small farming district and everyone knew everyone, and, it seemed to me, were mostly related! I was fortunate in that Barry had been living and farming with his family on Station Road (later to be renamed Eureka Road) for 14 years already (since June 1953) and knew all the locals. He was able to name all the families for me as I was duly introduced, and also explain who was related to whom....

The notable families who seemed to own most of the land were the Hintons, Clarkins, Duncans, Masters, Kimbers, McClennans, Larsens, Stokes and Barghs. Once I had these families figured out I was well on the way to sorting out who lived where. Even back then Eureka was very friendly and welcoming.

Barry and I arrived back from our honeymoon on the 10th July 1967, yes, decimal currency day, to find that our road was finally sealed right to the railway line. The last stage was done! Yeh! But Holland Road was still narrow and metalled and Waverley Road nonexistent. However, Waverley Road was officially named that August with survey work immediately getting under way and construction done in 1970. Resident, Mr Laurie Maber of Maber Lands, contribution £1400 towards the cost of the formation of the road. Waverley Islands really developed in the 1970's.

Not counting Jill and Noel Campbell's General Store and Post Office on the main road corner opposite the school, there were only 12 houses on Station Road, eight of them still being there today. Yes, counting Manor Park, there are at least 67 houses on Eureka Road today!

The next few years were busy as we raised our family of three, Shelley, Philip and Katrina. How wonderful it was for this new mum to have kindly local storekeeper, Noel, phone me every Tuesday for my grocery order which he then delivered to my doorstep, always with time for a chat. The advent of supermarkets over the next few years sadly saw the demise of local stores and Eureka's was no exception, closing in 1975. (The house and shop were later moved back on the section, turned around, and today is still the home of the Yuill family.)

Graeme Gatchell was our RD4 mailman, and Joe and Noeline Stockman owned and operated Eureka Motors. The community was lucky to have petrol and a good mechanic right in their midst. It was Joe who trained local apprentice Colin Duncan, who won the Kinsella Cup, awarded to the best mechanic in the Waikato, three

years in a row. Colin took over the garage 40 years ago and still serves us today.

Eureka Transport was a thriving business until the late 1970's operated out of their depot on Hinton Road by Hooper/Edwards family members.




The Eureka Drainage Board administered Eureka's drains back then, Barry taking over from his father, Fred, as Board member until the Waikato Regional Council took over in 1989. That year also saw the Ruakura Riding of the Waikato County Council disappear, to be replaced by the Eureka Ward (districts of Eureka, Tauwhare, Matangi, Newstead and Puketaha) of the new Waikato District Council. Rob McGuire succeeded his father, Dave, as our Councillor in 1983.

Many Clubs were thriving back then. Indoor bowls, badminton, Ladies Social Club, Federated Farmers, cards, Ladies afternoon badminton and so on. We enjoyed badminton for many years until lack of numbers in recently times saw the senior club fold and the juniors move to Matangi Hall.

The local hall was the social hub of the district. In 1968 funding had been raised, mainly through a County Council rating scheme, to replace the old hall which had served Eureka well for 54 years. I well remember the special family evening that was held in the old hall in July,

By October the landmark was gone forever. Ex local Tom Muir's tender of \$18,355 had been accepted and the foundations for the new hall were laid in November and the steelwork, blockwork and roof were completed by December.

The Hall Committee comprised Tom Hinton (Chair), Frank Hinton (Sec), Maurice Duncan,



They held their first meeting in the new hall on January 30, 1969 and after much community input the hall was officially opened on April 19. Afternoon tea was served to the 200

residents attending and that evening 216 people celebrated the opening at a Ball. The Annual Ball or Cabaret tradition was to continue for 26 years. Sadly, interest then waned, but two more successful Balls have since been held. Time for another??







As our children grew Eureka School became a real focal point for us. It was truly the hub of the community and a wonderful community asset that has been greatly missed since its closure 13 years ago. Parents and families bonded over School Committee and PTA meetings, calf clubs, sports days, school picnics, fundraisers and so on. We were a united district through our children for many years, but disappointingly, as numbers dwindled so did community loyalty. Our central location offered choices that many parents decided were preferable.

10-acre blocks were introduced and became popular in the 1970's but ensuing years and WDC rule changes saw many smaller sections being surveyed and sold off – the advent of lifestylers was underway.

In 1979 the Trigg family moved onto Eureka Road (now Turners) and it was through Paula's initiative that the Eureka Express was born – the Inaugural meeting being held in March 1980 and printing, on the old school Gestetner, began. For the first year. Paula was Editor. Australia then beckoned the family and Denise Irvine stepped up to fill Paula's shoes for the next four years until I landed the job in 1985. That year our Eureka history book was completed and published – unfortunately now "a collector's item" but it is online. Many local ladies have, and still do, serve on the Express committee and/or deliver or contribute in some way to make this an enjoyable community enterprise – more members always being most welcome...

On the roading front – in 1980 Factory Road was renamed Hunter Road and in October 1989, the last .7km of Holland Road was sealed – after 19 years, and much frustration and agitation by locals – since sealing began. Land had been purchased from the Railways the previous year to realign the Eureka/Holland Roads intersection to form a normal T-junction. 1991 saw Waverley Road seal completed, and in 1994 Hooper Road seal was completed. All long awaited by residents and motorists alike. Hinton Road had to wait until 2001.

In February 1990, after 23 years of marriage, our family moved a mile up the road – from No. 212 to No. 70 – these RAPID (Rural Address Property IDentification) numbers being introduced in 1994. The next 27 years of our marriage have been spent up on the hill at No. 70. Changes on the farm front saw the farm split in 1995 when Mayall Bros. (Graham and Barry) amicably dissolved their 40-year partnership as the next generation stepped up. Now Philip and Joelean own and operate the farm and Barry and I continue to live on our patch at No. 70.

Further notable changes in 1995 that affected us all locally: the rural water scheme was completed, the refuse collection by WDC commenced, and the four-term school year was introduced.

In early 1998 work began on Appleton Lanc's Eureka Park subdivision. The first of 21 new houses were completed in late 1999 (Sheds) along with a name change to Manor Park.

And in December 2003 our Eureka School closed, after 100 years. A very successful Jubilee was held in May 2004 to celebrate the Eureka District 1874-2004 and Eureka School 1904-2003. Copies of the Jubilee booklet are still freely available.

So many changes have been seen in our district over the last 50 years and the ups and downs of dairying have been weathered by the few remaining farmers. Bull farming, deer farming, goat farming, pig farming, emu farming, horse breeding, apple, asparagus growing and an orchard shop have all come and gone but we still have a poultry farm, broiler chickens, an apple orchard, olives, feijoas, blueberries, roses, a plant nursery and a Shed Company.

By 1967 the railway station settlement of five houses, a goods shed and cattle yards were gone, but Barry still remembers the families well who lived and worked there until the late 1950's. Farmers picked up their lime from the station and stock could still be sent by rail.

What hasn't changed over the years has been the numerous wonderful neighbours who have come and gone or stayed put. We have made many special and long-lasting friendships from their time in Eureka. The landscape may have changed hugely but Eureka is still a great place to live and we have no plans to leave any time soon....

Playgroup is enjoying a break with the school holidays at the moment. It is hard to believe that half the year has gone already and soon it will be summer and Christmas!




