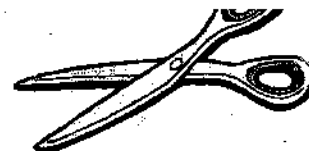

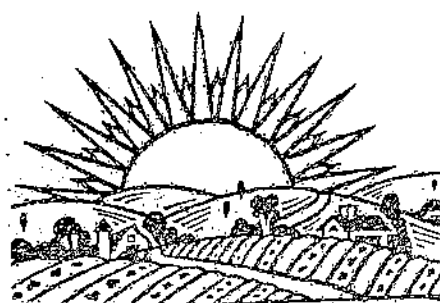

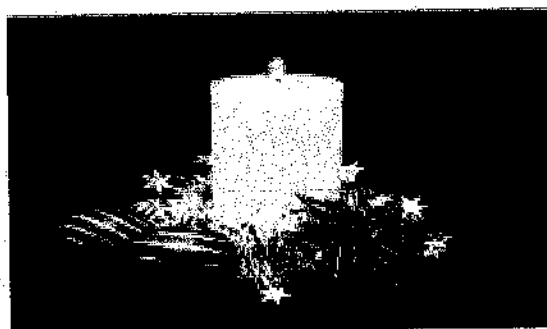

Christmas is also a time of year during which many of us will be busy shopping. We must not forget that criminals will also be out and about looking for easy targets to steal from.

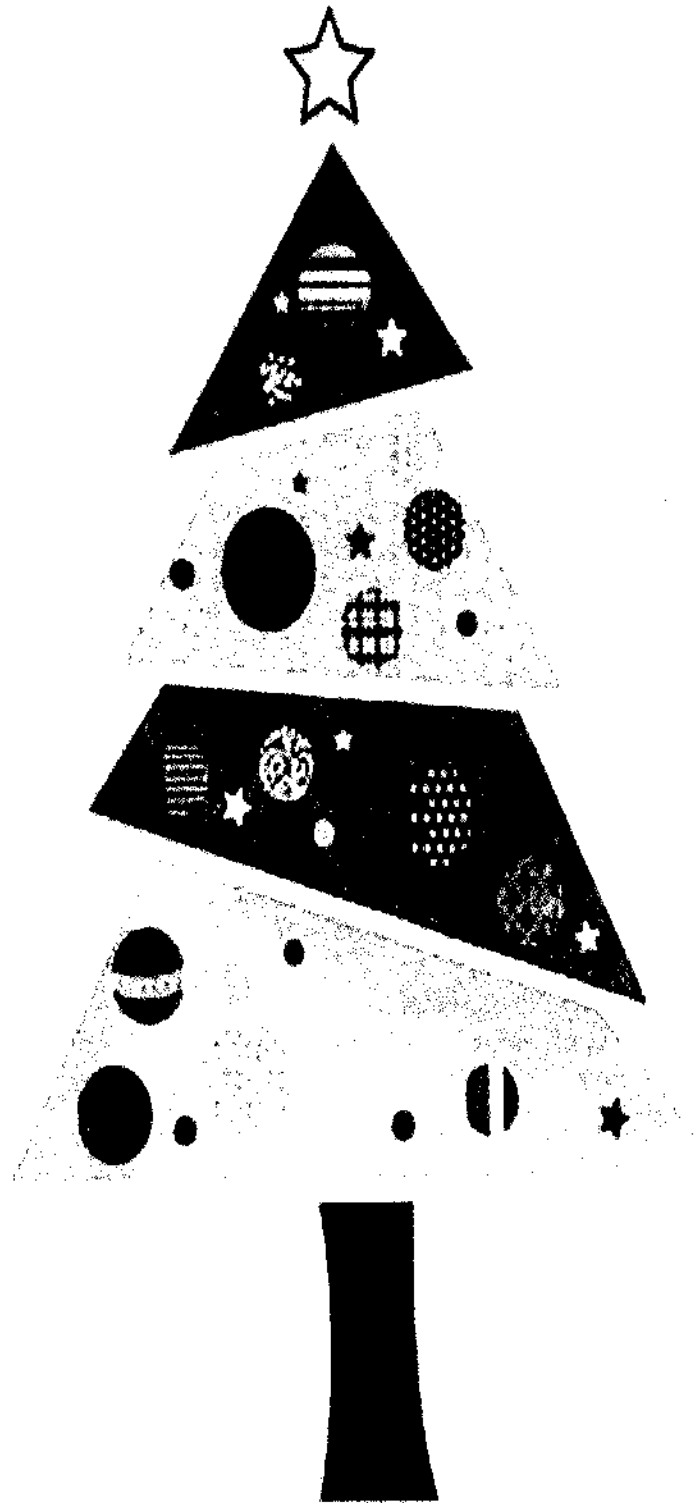
WHEN YOU ARE OUT AND ABOUT:

- Make sure ALL windows and doors are locked
- If you have a security door, lock it by using the key when you are home.
- Engrave your property and record it on SNAP
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed
- Put away tools, gardening equipment and ladders, thieves may use these to gain access
- Remember to lock garden sheds and garages

WHILE YOUR DOING YOUR CHRISTMAS SHOPPING:

- Bag and purse snatching is not an uncommon crime. It can happen anywhere. Stop the bag snatcher by always carrying your bag over your shoulder and tucked down the arm.
- To discourage purse-snatchers, don't overburden yourself with packages. Make use of home delivery services or click and collect.
- Do not leave your bag in the shopping trolley.
- Shop before dark if possible. Coordinate shopping trips with friends.
- Lock your parcels and gifts in your vehicle's boot.

TASTE BUDS

GINGER ALE CHRISTMAS CAKE

1 kg Mixed Fruit (raisins, sultanas, peel, cherries, currants)
300mls Dry Ginger Ale
125g Butter
2 Dessertspoons Golden Syrup
375g Plain Flour
1 teaspoon Mixed Spice
1 Tablespoon Rum/Brandy
250g Sugar
4 Eggs
1 teaspoon Baking Powder



- 1 Soak fruit with Ginger Ale and Brandy/ Rum overnight.
- 2 Line 20 – 23cm cake tin with brown paper, then with grease-proof paper.
- 3 Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy then add Golden Syrup.
- 4 Add Eggs, one at a time, beating well. If mixture splits, add a couple of Tablespoons of the flour between the eggs.
- 5 Add dry ingredients and finally fold in the fruit and any remaining liquid.
- 6 BAKE (not fan bake) at 130 – 140 degrees C for 2½ - 3 hours.

TIPS I put a small bowl of water on the bottom rack to help keep cake moist and I sit the cake tin on a thick piece of cardboard to prevent over-cooking the bottom of the cake. The oven rack is one lower than the middle.

Directions: Melt butter in boiling water, add soda then mix in rest of the ingredients. Cook in steamed pudding bowl in double boiler for approx. 2 hours, when skewer comes out clean.

roll into small balls and coat with coconut. Leave in fridge overnight or freezer for a couple of hours.

(I make a double batch and keep in freezer for Xmas plates that you can just add some strawberries to.)

Identifying Scam Emails

Many people are getting a lot of emails, purportedly from their bank or some other prominent business such as Facebook or Paypal, with messages such as:

"To confirm your **Online** account, You must Sign On before **Nov. 19, 2017.** "

or

"You are required to sign in for verification of account to avoid being permanently locked out. "
or any of a million other tactics. These are almost always scams.

The problem is, these emails are getting harder and harder to identify, and closer and closer to looking like the real thing. How do you figure out which is real and which is fake?

1. For starters, check the email address that the email is coming from. If the email address doesn't have a domain (the part after the '@' symbol) which is the same as the website of the actual business (eg. "something@westpac.co.nz" for westpac), it's a fake.
2. Similarly, check the "reply-to" field of the email (you may have to right-click the email and go to 'properties' or similar to find this information, with some email programs). The same rules apply – if the "reply-to" email address's domain isn't the same as the real business, it's a fake.
3. The email will typically contain a link to a website if it's fake. That is not to say that a *real* email **won't** contain a link, but fake ones almost always will. If you hover your mouse over that link, it should show you the website address the link goes to – and again, if that website is not the same as the purported business's **actual** website, don't click on it – it's probably a trap :)
4. Legitimate websites will tend not to have spelling or grammar mistakes, so if the spelling or grammar is poor, it's probably fake. In addition, the language will probably be urgent, encouraging you to act as soon as possible.
5. Does the email use your actual name/business name? Real businesses probably will. A scam will tend to use a non-committal salutation like "sir".

Luckily there are email programs, as well as anti-virus packages, which do a great job of filtering out the bulk of junk and scam emails - if you want me to set one up for you, give me a bell!

CO COMMENT FOR EUREKA EXPRESS

“Spring days are finally here”, with decent pasture growing conditions although farmers are wondering why they don’t seem to be seeing them & little pasture surpluses can be found. With farms being shorter on covers and staying on fast rounds to ensure the cows are maintaining their grass intake through mating, the growth potential of the grass is being reduced.

Although we seem to be right on the line in terms of daily allocation to meet post-grazing residuals. Not enough grass left in the paddock to say we are in surplus, but enough to affect the quality in future rounds & daughter tillering for pasture persistence going into summer. Seed heads are prominent in the pastures now, so the preference for most seems to be pre-mowing to keep the tractor clean & restore the residual to a lower level than what the cows would achieve to improve quality in subsequent grazing. A Lincoln University Dairy Farm Trial showed, similar to earlier trials in the 1990’s, that there are no effects with pre-mowing on milk solids (kgMS) production or dry matter intake (DMI) compared to normal grazing.

As we get closer to summer (late December onwards), we need to get closer to the recommended 30-day rotation, determined by the average numbers of days required for a ryegrass plant to re-establish 3 leaves after grazing during summer. Achieving a 30-day rotation helps the plants manage the increased stress of summer & increase growth. Changing from a spring rotation of 21-23 days to 30 days will require several efforts as it’s not done overnight. Returning paddocks for silage to the rotation; N fertiliser; Crop; Supplement; Deferring late surplus grass; & leaving 1 paddock a week to get longer for a fence to break up will all help to achieve this.

As AB comes to an end for most, submission rates have varied farm to farm with intervention helping to achieve better results. Farmers with lower submissions will be helped if they receive good conception rates for those cows that were put up. As for bull numbers to continue the job for the rest of mating, there is an app on your phone you can download for free ‘bull requirements post AB’ that will determine the bull power your farm requires.

If you are struggling with the season and would like a second pair of eyes to review your system, please don’t hesitate to contact me.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR



Last month I advised that a "Future of our Libraries" Survey had been sent to all residents. Thank you to those who completed the survey. A large number of very well considered and helpful comments were received with the 436 surveys returned from Eureka Ward residents - a total across the district of 5328 surveys were returned. We have had one workshop so far to consider the results and we will be having further discussions with our neighbouring Councils before any decisions are made.

In my last two newsletters I have commented that we have been preparing the **draft of our District Plan (DDP)**. This is now ready for feedback, so we are holding a series of drop in sessions to talk about the key issues that may effect your property, community and / or the whole district. The session for Eureka and Tamahere Wards will be held at the **Tamahere Community Centre on Wednesday 6th December – any time between 2pm & 7pm.**

Staff and Councillors will be there to discuss the DDP which includes information on:

What is the District Plan and how does it affect growth; Amenities (Home occupations, noise, dust etc); Biodiversity, landscape & natural character areas; Country living and village subdivision; Earthworks (which includes farm tracks, cleanfill etc, building platforms), Hazardous substances & solid waste; Industrial, business and businesstown centre zones; Infrastructure and energy; Natural hazards & climate change; Residential subdivision; Rural zones & special use zones; Heritage & tangata whenua.

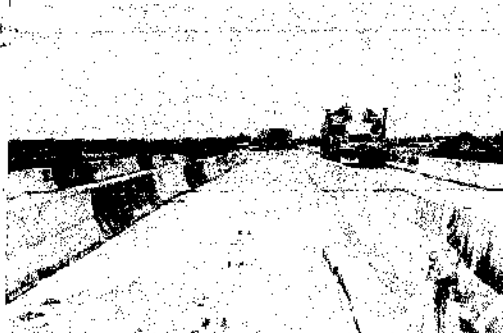
Are you involved in a community group or other organisation in the Waikato District? Applications are opening in December and January for a range of Council-administered funds to support community projects and events for the next year. There are funds for supporting creative and performing arts, heritage, conservation and a range of other community projects and events.

Three funds have closing dates in February for the first round of applications:

- Discretionary Grants funds – opens 1 Dec; closes 2 February
- Creative Communities Fund – opens 1 Dec; closes 23 February
- Heritage Project Fund – opens 19 January; closes 23 February

The Community Wellbeing Trust has a single funding round which opens on 26 January and closes on 30 March. For more information go to www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz/funding.

The work on the Expressway ramps up now that the earthmoving season has recommenced. Traffic is now travelling ~~over the Morrinsville Road Bridge~~ and the Ruakura Rail Bridge has opened for construction traffic. This bridge is a vital part of the haul road allowing construction traffic to travel across road and rail traffic. Puketaha Road is being widened to allow for the installation of a dedicated right-turn lane. This will keep traffic flowing while the bridge foundations are being built.

I was very interested to read in the latest NZTA update of the science around the placement of the myriad of orange traffic cones we see every day.

The Alliance has four full-time qualified traffic management staff plus contracted crews at specific sites. The layout of the orange traffic cones is planned well in advance by the Traffic Managers to allow motorists to travel in a safer and more efficient way. There is a science behind traffic management and understanding how a driver reacts to visual cues is part of the science – e.g., the way the cones are arranged will affect how fast people drive.

Section 10A of the **Dog Control Act 1996** requires each local council to report annually on its dog control policy. In the 2016-17 rating year there were 14,791 known dogs in the Waikato District owned by 9250 owners - approximately 20% of these dogs were on a property of more than 20 hectares. We employ 11 staff and last year our teams responded to more than 3000 complaints that ranged from dog attacks, barking nuisances and roaming complaints. We also responded to 376 service requests involving roaming livestock. Our team follows a policy of approach, engagement and education before enforcement, finding that this approach has had a positive impact on their relationship with dog owners, the health and safety of staff and service satisfaction of our customers.

If you have a **swimming pool or spa** you should have received a letter detailing your responsibilities and advising you of inspection details. Because of legislative changes all pools need to be inspected every three years to ensure they continue to meet the requirements of the Building Act. If you want to discuss this with us phone 0800 492 452 - the Duty Inspector is available every morning from 8am to 10am.
