
Term 4 - October 2019

Thank you and well done to the children and families who entered an animal this year. The work put in by the children paid off on the day and it was fantastic to see them all with their goat being proud.






Flower Show/Vegetable Creations

TASTE BUDS

IMPOSSIBLE QUICHE

This recipe is brilliant because you can virtually use any filling ingredients you have on hand into it. I will often add chopped-up leftover roast meat and vegetable. Great for lunches or a light dinner when served with a salad.



INGREDIENTS:

2 cups eggs, ham, chicken and herbs, chopped 1 ½ cups milk 3 eggs, lightly beaten

1 cup grated cheese

1 onion, diced

½ cup self-raising flour

Salt and pepper to taste (approx. ½ tsp pf each)

METHOD

- Preheat oven to 180 deg. C (350 deg. F) and grease quiche dish.
- Place all the ingredients in a large bowl and mix
- Pour into prepared dish
- Bake for about 45 minutes or until golden brown.

ORANGE AND ALMOND CAKE

Fill your home with the gorgeous aroma of freshly baked orange cake

INGREDIENTS

2 large navel oranges (choose oranges with unblemished skins as the whole fruit is used in this recipe.

5 Eggs

1 ½ cups (250g) caster sugar


2 ½ (250g) ground almonds

1 teaspoon gluten-free baking powder

Pure icing sugar to serve.

METHOD

- Preheat oven to 170 deg. C. Grease and line the base of a heart-shaped pan.
- Place the two whole oranges in a saucepan and cover with water. Bring to the boil an simmer, covered for 1 hour ensuring that the oranges remain covered with water. Drain and cool. Chop the oranges into quarters, discard any seeds, then place the chunks into a blender and puree until smooth.
- Beat the eggs with the sugar until thick, then add the orange puree, ground almonds and baking powder and mix well.
- Pour into prepared pan and bake for 1 hour. Leave cake to firm up in pan for 2 minutes then turn out, remove the baking paper and turn over to finish cooling the right way up. This cake definitely mellows with a little time and can be prepared up to 48 hours in advance.
- To serve, sift icing sugar on top decorate with orange zest and almonds.



Gender Inequality of Media Coverage and Pay Within Sport

We are three year ten students who attend Hillcrest High School. Last term, we were tasked by our Social Studies teacher with completing an inquiry into one of the 17 United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. With a focus on goal 5, gender equality, we researched the inequalities of media coverage and pay that women face in professional sports. Our inquiry was based on three research questions: why does gender inequality in sports exist, how has this changed over time, and what initiatives have been or will be put into place by sports organisations, governments or companies to address the inequality? As part of our research we interviewed one of the PE teachers at our school, Ms Natasha Brill, who is a former player of the NZ Women's Black Sticks Hockey team. She helped us to understand our issue by giving us insight into the discrimination she has faced during her time representing New Zealand.

One question we asked her was how she thinks coverage of men's sports compares to women's sports in New Zealand. She told us that she thinks many of the news outlets were 'ridiculous', saying that there were multiple articles for rugby teams, yet nothing was posted when the Black Sticks made the Olympics. Another point we didn't think about until talking to her was the sexualisation of female athletes. Media outlets don't want to invest time in female athletes if they 'haven't had their kids yet'. Photographers take photos from inappropriate angles, and advertisers put their logos across the chest of the uniforms instead of on the midriff or back.

The other half of our inquiry was focused on pay. We were told that "the most that any of the players in my team could get would be \$21,000, when some All Blacks players could be funded upwards of half a million \$ for a club deal." Ms Brill also told us that Richie McCaw was offered a knighthood for captaining the All Blacks to the World Cup. "Should that not be a reward in itself?" she said. "The netball players won their World Cup and didn't even get prize money."

After having our eyes opened to the discrimination that women face in sport here in New Zealand, we decided one of the best things we could do would be to advocate for these female athletes, who deserve just as much opportunity and reward as our men.

Therefore, if you feel just as passionate about supporting women in sport as we do, try tuning into a game of women's sport, or encourage your sisters, daughters, and other women in your life to participate, so that the playing field is fair and these inequalities no longer exist. We're now working towards a presentation at the end of November to inform our school community and advocate further for equality in sports.



Freeware to the rescue!

It occurred to me today that the number of additional pieces of software I use in Windows is quite staggering. I rarely, if ever, use the built-in Windows apps (asides from maybe Calculator), as there's almost always something better in the freeware world. For those of you who don't know, 'freeware' means free software, of which there is a ton on the Windows platform. It's one of the reasons I stick with windows, because for everything I need, there's almost always a program which will do it, and in the specific way I want it to be done. This is not always true for Linux.

So I thought I'd share with you some of my favourite bits of freeware - all of these are lightweight applications with no cost, which greatly simplify certain tasks. First up, Irfanview (https://www.irfanview.com). This little bit of software replaces the Windows photo viewer and has the advantage of being blisteringly fast, but is also able to view tons of image types which the Windows viewer can't. The only complaint I have is that the nice icons for photos get replaced by the rather ugly Irfanview icon, but it's a small price to pay.

Secondly, I'm a big fan of x2plorer lite (https://www.zabkat.com/x2lite.htm). This is like the Windows File Explorer, but gives you multiple panes for viewing different folders in. If you do a lot of heavy file or image management, it's an absolute godsend. The default interface has a few ugly toolbars and whatnot, but you can turn all of them off and customise it to your hearts content. Makes navigating folders and files a lot simpler.

Third is Agent Ransack (https://www.mythicsoft.com/agentransack/). There used to be a decent file search tool back in the days of Windows XP (cutesy search animation notwithstanding), but since then we've had relatively ineffectual search functionality in Windows. Agent Ransack allows you to search for filenames, part of a filename, or to search by the age of a file or by what the file contents are, and it doesn't screw up the way the Windows one does. Once installed, it's simply a matter of right-clicking on a drive or folder, clicking Agent Ransack and going from there.

Openshell (https://github.com/Open-Shell/Open-Shell-Menu/releases) is my fourth pick — initially it was designed to give Windows 8 and 10 users the old (Windows 7 style) start menu back, but it is also a tool you can use to customise make your start menu (the icon you click on in the bottom left) on any version of Windows. Initially you choose from one of three styles (XP, Vista or Windows 7), and after that you can customise things further if you so choose.

Flux (https://justgetflux.com), the fifth tool, is only really necessary for Windows 8 and below. It changes the screen colour ("temperature") so that it emits less blue light in the evenings. Blue light stops your brain producing melatonin, which in turn can make getting to sleep difficult. Windows 10 has a similar feature built in (but turned off by default) called "Night Light". If you're still using Windows 7 or below you should upgrade to Windows 8 or 10, as 7 expires in 2020 (call me!).

My last recommendation is a media player. The built-in players for Windows are slow and have difficulty playing certain types of files. MPC-BE (https://sourceforge.net/projects/mpcbe/) does not have these issues, is tiny and easy to install. For older or slower hardware in particular, it can make video playback much better.


If you're needing a particular type of software to do a specific thing and you're struggling to find it, google with some search terms relating to the activity you're wanting to do and the word "freeware". Chances are you'll find what you're looking for. But be wary: some forms of software masquerade as freeware while actually being trials for paid software. Use your head and always make sure your virus scanner is active when downloading software off the internet.

Live insects invade Waikato Museum over Spring and Summer

Live insects are invading Waikato Museum in a new family-friendly, hands-on exhibition opening on Friday (25 October) in time for Labour Day weekend and running through the summer.

Bugs! Our Backyard Heroes is a free-entry exhibition exploring the secret world of bugs and the vital role they play in our lives. It also brings visitors face-to-face with some real live mini-monsters, including a giant centipede, tree weetaa, stick insects, locusts, crickets, cockroaches and Avondale spiders.

Waikato Museum Director Cherie Meecham says: "This exhibition provides visitors a unique opportunity to learn about the different native species of bugs in New Zealand and the precarious position they sometimes hold in the ecosystem."

Plenty of hands-on activities will stimulate youngsters' minds with ideas, including how to become a citizen scientist and how bugs inspire those on the frontline of technology, she says.

"We invite schools to contact our education team to take advantage of a tailored programme for school visits," says Ms Meecham.

The exhibition has been developed and toured by Puke Ariki, New Plymouth.

Activities for younger visitors include a chance to dress-up in a bug costume.

I feel very privileged to have been re-elected to represent you as your Ward Councillor for the next three years.




The new Council will be sworn in on 30th October with a busy month of workshops and induction sessions to follow. Our last meeting for the year will be held on 9th December.

Kia ora supporters,

Despite the frequent, heavy rain, this Spring has been stunning. Don't miss out on the last of the bluebells and numerous other flowering plants in the park if you haven't been lately. And the frogs are croaking again!

We have taken the plunge and employed a full-time gardener, Harpreet Singh, who is proving to be a great asset and successor to Derek and Colin. He along with Sue Smith's one day per week will be invaluable help for keeping the park up to visitor standard.

Some of you will know that we had a unique opportunity to harvest the pines in the upper reaches of the park without damaging the arboretum and main trail. This is because our neighbours were taking out their pines. Our 27-year-old pine trees were starting to cause a hazard so it's a great relief they are gone. The last logging truck left two days ago! We were really fortunate that the forestry crew were so skilful working close to the main trail. John and Harpreet have already planted 50 trees in the past few weeks on the expectation the wet weather will continue through spring. The park is still a Permanent Forest Sink under the Emissions Trading Scheme---but we know the government will be making changes to this by the end of the year. Come May and throughout winter 2020 we will be planting thousands more trees. ..more long-lasting than pines -- and it is still our intention to remain in the ETS if possible.

Our consistent Sunday openings are going well, as are visitors choosing to purchase annual passes so they can come in any daylight hour. We have several events coming up which we hope will boost our profile and reinforce that the park is not just a one-off visit. The Creative Play Weekend (26 - 28 October) is a way of showcasing the numerous family outdoor activities to choose from here: https://www.eventfinda.co.nz/2019/creative-play-weekend/hamilton We have also been prompted to choose Saturday, 30th November as a special event for visitors to walk their dogs in the park.

Thank you to all of you who help spread the message that we are more accessible again through Facebook and other social media.

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

SOIL AERATION

In modern farming practices the advantages of using a soil aerator to break up compacted and pugged soils to lift pasture production are often overlooked. Intense stocking rates, strip grazing, heavy machinery and prolonged winter rainfall will leave soils vulnerable to pugging and



compaction. Advantages gained by using a soil aerator: -

- Improved drainage The free draining soil will allow rainwater to pass through into drains or enter the water table reducing ponding and runoff.
- Reduced surface runoff During heavy rain the less compacted soils allow the rain water to soak into the ground thus retaining both animal and artificial fertiliser on the farm and reduces contaminated runoff into waterways.
- Reduced soil erosion With less surface runoff there will be less erosion of the top soil resulting in a more sustainable farming practice.
- Increased pasture root mass and depth With less compaction the grass root mass and depth will increase that will enable the plant to feed and grow better.
- Releases locked up soil nutrients With extra plant root mass and depth plants are able to make use of previously locked up soil nutrients resulting in extra growth and a reduction in future fertiliser requirements.
- Increased worm populations Aerated soils lead to a 70 to 90% increase in worm populations resulting in faster breakdown of organic matter and animal dung to produce a healthier soil and plant life.
- Increase in air porosity around the plant root structure Ruakura research has shown that there is a 10% increase in pasture production for every 1% increase in air filled porosity above a critical air-filled porosity level of 10%
- Increases spring pasture boost Due to better drainage spring soils are dryer and therefore warmer which promotes a better spring growth response.

The James Soil Aerator was manufactured to overcome the compaction of soil structures which result in excess moisture on pasture surfaces, shallow root systems and restricted plant growth.

The three-point linkage mounted implement aerates the top 25 cm of the soil, draining the pasture surface and giving increased worm population and activity. This also increases root growth which in turn produces pasture growth, at the same time retaining fertility on the surface. The increased depth of root structure results is greater ability to produce growth in dry weather conditions.

The unique waving action as the turf flows through the blade assemblies produces maximum fracturing of the top 25 cm layer and releases minerals which have been unavailable because of a lack of oxygen.

M.A.F. trials conducted on pasture in Southland produced an average dry matter increase of 21.7% over a 15-month period.
