
5+ A DAY AT SCHOOL




Pukeko Country Preschool




We have had a busy start to the term with lots of exciting things happening and a number of new families joining us.




Forest School

Swimming Pool



A Celebration of Recycling

A creative look at the topic of recycling will take centre stage next month at The Sculpture Park at Waitakaruru Arboretum in Tauwhare.

Celebrating the "Art if Recycling," will be held at the Sculpture Park over the weekend of March 14-15.

It will feature the work of three of New Zealand's foremost artists all known for the sculpting of recycled material – Nathan Hull, Marti Wong and Adrian Worsley.

Metal Sculpture artist and engineering fitter-turner by trade, Nathan Hull, has been working his craft for years, transforming a host of discarded workshop items into masterpieces that include motorbikes, dragon, a taniwha, a griffin and more. His creations have won awards and are in demand both nationally and internationally.

Marti Wong is a full-time, self-taught artist specialising in metal sculpture, primarily using recycled materials. He spent years observing nature, studying books and comics then turning scrap metal into objects reflecting his unique view on the world. His pieces, which are strongly influenced by mythology and science fiction, range from small insects to life-size dinosaurs and adorn workplaces and public spaces.

Te Aroha's Adrian Worsley designs and makes original sculptures entirely from recycled materials. A form fitter/welder he has perfected his craft over many years, blending materials such as copper, steel and wood as he transforms inanimate objects into tactile pieces of art that are much in demand. He is the creator of the transformer-style giant bull commissioned by an apple-growing and packing company in Napier.

The Sculpture Park is a 17.5 hectare 'art-in-nature' trail that displays over 100 sculptures and installations among more than 20,000 trees and shrubs. The woodland setting is now a protected forest. Over the past 28 years, owners John and Dorothy Wakeling turned what was a disused quarry into one of New Zealand's largest outdoor galleries, where they now host a varied programme of annual exhibitions, and open Weekends in support of charity.

Celebrating the Art of Recycling is intended to provide an opportunity for visitors to learn about how each of the featured artists develop their sculptures, said Dorothy. There will be talks and question and answer sessions scheduled at 11am and 2pm on both days.

"The event highlights how some artists reuse waste metal" she said. The event supports the park's principles around sustainable art. These include encouraging creativity with renewable materials and celebrating artists who use recyclable materials, and renovating and caring for sculptures and installations. www.sculpturepark.co.nz



What kind of computer should I buy?

How long is a piece of string? If a tree falls in the forest and no-one is around to hear it, does it make a sound? All good questions, supposedly without answers. Luckily the answer to the question "What kind of computer do I need?" is a little more attainable. To start with, most computer-users or 'netizens' as we used to call them (back before the internet was part of every moment of our waking lives), use computers for five activities: editing documents, checking email, going to websites, looking at or storing their photos, and playing games.

The first four require very little from a modern computer; even a computer from 5 years ago or a tablet is going to be fine for doing all of that. You can get a laptop if you want – they don't tend to last terribly long compared to desktop machines though, and if anything breaks you have to replace the whole thing, rather than just a component as you would with a desktop machine. The only reason to get a laptop is if you need to use it in different spaces.

Therefore for most users I tend to advise going for a new-ish, but cheap-ish desktop computer – and not a name brand. They (Dell, HP, etc) tend to skimp on quality and therefore have poor reliability longer-term, at least for desktop PCs. But a trusted local PC company of some sort (or your friendly neighbourhood computer guy nudge nudge wink wink) will generally have something that is "lower budget" comparatively, but more-than sufficient for your needs. Also avoid all-in-one (AlO) machines – those large screens with a computer built into them – they're worse than laptops for reliability and replacement parts.

The fifth activity I mentioned earlier (games) is where you start to see an increase in both requirements and price, if the games in question are 3D, and not your standard "solitaire" or "minesweeper" 2D games. If they're 3D, you'll need a beefier power supply (PSU) — at least 600 watts — and a graphics card. Luckily even cheap graphics cards are quite powerful nowadays, so depending on your game and monitor resolution, you can get away with not spending much. You may also want more RAM for 3D games. 8GB (gigabytes) used to be standard, but 16GB is becoming commonly recommended. Meanwhile, regular desktop users are unlikely to see any difference in performance from having more than 4GB of ram.

Something that I recommend for both gamers and non-gamers alike is an SSD drive, at least for your operating system. Compared to a regular hard drive, an SSD drive is about 10 times faster. And M2 drives (the latest standard) are about 10 times faster than that again! SSD drives make a huge difference for most computers, and are almost a necessity on windows 10, given how often it uses the hard drive. They don't tend to be as large as regular hard drives though, so if you're storing more than 700GB of documents/photos/data/etc, maybe get a secondary regular drive just for data.

At any rate, once you have your base computer, you might want to add a few things, depending on your requirements. Do you connect to your internet via wifi or an ethernet cable (a cable which runs from your modem to your computer)? If wifi, you'll need an additional card in the machine. Do you want to plug in SD cards (the type you get with older digital cameras)? You'll need something for that too!

Then there's software – the operating system (most likely Windows 10), Microsoft Office if you need it (most people can get by with the free Libreoffice), and whatever else you require. All up, a new machine with all the bells and whistles can set you back anywhere between \$700 and \$1400. It all comes down to what you want to do with it. And whether Solitaire is entertaining enough.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 18 FEBRUARY 2020



As I write this, my first newsletter for 2020, we are nearly at the end of summer – black skies are overhead, but I suspect we won't see any rain today.

I know many residents in Eureka Ward who depend on rainwater to supply their household needs are struggling to source water to top up their tanks. Our family are fortunate to have an underground water source to supply water to our stock and garden and we are connected to the **Southern Districts Water Scheme** (a trickle system that sources water from Hamilton City) for our house water but we are well aware we must not waste this valuable commodity. On 5th February Hamilton City moved to **Water Alert 3** after recording the second highest usage stats ever. As no rain has fallen since then, the alert

level has not changed. This means no use of sprinklers outside, but at this stage hand-held hosing can be done at any time.

Fire and Emergency New Zealand has declared a prohibited fire season, effective from 3 February 2020 for the entire Waikato district. A prohibited fire season can be imposed at any time throughout the year by the Principal Rural Fire Officer during periods of extreme fire danger, and no fire of any description may be lit in the open air. Council reconvened in late January after our summer break. Since then we have been meeting regularly and meetings have included hearing submissions on *Waikato 2070* and the *Speed Bylaw*; commencing the Long Term Plan process; meeting with our Hamilton City counterparts - to discuss growth and boundaryless planning to improve common understanding and discuss working together to achieve the best outcomes for our wider communities; holding a Councillor only day without staff input to discuss our aspirations for the next three years and on 14th February we joined the wider community for the ribbon cutting on the 12km Ohinewai-Taupiri section of the Waikato Expressway. There are a few final finishing touches to make to this section before NZTA open it to traffic within the next month.

I also represent Waikato District on the **Hauraki Gulf Forum** and yesterday was the first meeting of the Forum where we elected our new Chair and Deputy Chairs for this three-year term. Next week I will attend the 20th birthday celebration of the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park.

This year we will be reviewing our waste services contracts as they come up for renewal. The changes to the waste industry are having significant impacts on how we deal with waste so we must meet these challenges. We'll be coming into the community to discuss how we can achieve our vision for the future as set out in our Waste Management and Minimisation Plan — we'll advertise the dates we will be in your community and also post them on our website and Facebook page.

In the December issue of Council's newsletter Link, https://www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz/news/link-newsletter, we asked residents to report any illegal dumping by phoning 0800 492 452 anytime or via the Council's website www.waikatodistrict.govt/dumpers or on our Facebook Group @dodgydumpers. Staff also made a recommendation that green waste should not be thrown over banks, even though its organic, as it can cause lots of problems; also if you live in a village, please don't put grass clippings around the roots of street trees — we have found it is killing some of the trees.
