





EASTER COLOURING COMPETITION



QSM CONGRATULATIONS

Past Eureka resident and identity, Kerry Clarkin JP, was awarded the Queen's Service Medal (QSM) in the New Year Honours 2021, for services to agriculture and the community.

Kerry was born, raised, and a resident of Eureka until 2012, continuing his family tradition of involvement and leadership in the community. He became a dairy farmer on leaving school, taking over from his dad,

Harry Clarkin, and bought the farm on SH 26 from his parents in 1977. Kerry became involved as a Young Farmer with the Agricultural Fieldays Society in 1971, almost from its 1969 inception. From Chairman of the Ag Fieldays Society he went on to serve a term as President of the National Fielday Society from 1998.

Kerry was made a Life Member of the Ag Fieldays in 2002 and is still actively involved – 50 years of commitment.

Despite the many hours the Fieldays necessitated off his farm Kerry was always a willing volunteer on the local scene of Eureka. He served a total of 24 years on the Hall Committee, the last seven as Chairman, served on two School Jubilee committees, chairing the Centenary celebrations in 2004. When his and Erica's boys, Shaun and Matthew, were of primary age the Board of Trustees was a focus and the unenviable job of liaising the forced closure with the Ministry of Education in 2003 fell to Kerry – a stressful and sad time for all.

Kerry has been a JP since 1993. He chaired the initial Community Committee and was a supporter and deliverer of the Eureka Express for many years.

Once his boys reached secondary level Kerry served on the St John's College Board of Trustees.

The wider and local community has much to thank Kerry for and we warmly congratulate him on being recognised for a well-deserved NZ Honour.





Plenty of dates available to book an event, so if you would like to book a function, contact Gail Mayall 8241758.


We will still maintain the Covid scanning and hand sanitiser regulation in the hall, and we encourage anyone using the hall, to please use it.


Kaahui Ako Lead Principal


Our new ambassadors ran their first Friday assembly. They included dressing in House colours, joke of the week, kindness and anti-bullying messages and









Newstead has started 2021 with another busy start to the term. It was great to see the children's smiling faces back at school. We're looking forward to another great year of learning and growing.




Forest School

During Forest school sessions the children are encouraged to work with others to carry out activities such as den/shelter building, role play, exploration, practical and creative skills and tasks.








Chinese New Year Celebrations

Basic computer terms

I've noticed a surprising preponderance of folk who don't know what to name things in a computer. This is indicative of the age we live in, where people grow up with computers and basic understanding is assumed to be instinctual. Due of this, computer systems tend to be *very* poor at communicating nowadays, favouring some vague aesthetic over clarity. Disappointing of course, but the world is this way, so here's a bunch of guff for those who're on the novice end of the computer-literacy scale:

- Computer: that's the box on the floor with all the wires plugging into it, if you've got a desktop computer, or the entire unit screen-and-all if you've got a laptop or an "all-in-one" (ie. a monitor with a computer in it).
- Peripherals: anything that's not directly joined to the computer itself, so in the case of a desktop that'd be
 the mouse, monitor and keyboard, whereas for a laptop only things like external drives and external
 mice/keyboards are considered peripherals.
- Hard drive: not the box or the laptop. A hard drive is a small storage unit that sits inside the computer and stores programs, data and the operating system.
- Operating system or 'OS': what you use to access your files and programs. In terms of PC's, this is
 usually some form of Windows, in terms of Macs this is OSX, in terms of phones this is Android or IOS.
- Programs: also known as 'applications' or 'apps', these are what you use to do stuff on a computer.
 Operating systems tend to include a bunch of programs, such as 'File Explorer' on Windows (what you use to explore your documents etc) or 'Finder' on OSX (same diff for Macs).
- Files: pieces of data stored in a computer. Some files are parts of programs or the OS, some files are your files, such as documents and pictures. 'Your files' are often collectively referred to as 'your data' by techies.
- Office package: a set of programs for basic office work, like writing letters, creating spreadsheets or presentations. Examples include LibreOffice, Microsoft Office and Google Docs.
- Memory/RAM: very fast storage that programs and the OS get stored in temporarily while they are running.
- The Internet: a vast worldwide interconnected network of computers and devices. Also know as 'The Web'.
- Website: a place on the internet. A website may contain many "pages" effectively many sub-places.
- Web browser: a program that allows you to access websites. Examples include Google Chrome, Mozilla
 Firefox, Opera, and last but definitely least, Microsoft Edge and Microsoft Internet Explorer.
- Search engine: a website which allows you to search other websites for keywords and images, etcetera.
 Examples include DuckDuckGo, Google and Bing.
- Taskbar: in Windows, this is the bar at the bottom of the screen where you can click on different buttons to switch between programs, and also launch some programs. Mac equivalent is called the 'Dock'.

This is a bare minimum of terminology you need to effectively communicate with others about computers.

There are a gazillion more terms, but I have limited space, so for whatever else you need to know, boot up your computer, run your web browser program, go to a search engine, and search for it.

You don't want to buy a cow from a stationary store. You wouldn't buy a car from The Warehouse. So why do we so frequently buy computers from non-computer stores? Computers are highly technical items, not to be trifled with — I should know. It's not the sort of thing you want your average appliance-pusher selling you. Yet so often I see people buying from Harvey Norman, Noel Leeming and other "general purpose" stores — because inevitably when you get an issue with your device, those places can't help you. They don't have the right kind of staff with the right level of experience. Things usually have to be shipped back to whichever distributor they came from and processed under manufacturer warranty.

When you buy a computer from an actual computer store, for starters, you're more likely to get the right computer. You probably don't need the most expensive thing in the room. You may only need something for checking emails and browsing the web — why would you need a \$1000 PC for such things? But a salesperson in a non-computer store doesn't really have a clue what you need, they only know what their percentage and/or sales ratings are (depending on how their salary works), and that doesn't necessarily bode well for your purchase. And when you have a problem, they don't have a clue. In a computer store there's so much knowledge floating around that even if one person doesn't know, another person probably does, and that makes dealing with issues a lot easier further down the track.


Lastly I should comment on the quality of both the technical staff and the computers at non-computer stores. They're both driven largely by price, so you don't tend to get the most reliable machines or people in those places. You see a lot of HP laptops (the worst) and technical people who don't really know their arse from their elbow. Someone saying they're a 'Microsoft certified engineer' or the like isn't meaningful in any real sense – it's like having a degree. Except, like, a really crummy degree. That only took you 3 months to earn. Experience is key. At least in a computer store there's enough people who know what they're doing to be able to spot or correct the ones who don't – and even if they have the cheaper computers, they also tend to have better brands as well.

That's not to say you won't ever have issues with a real computer store, or it's staff – but the percentage ratios of good experiences to bad experiences tend to go up. A computer is not an appliance. A computer is a magical everything-box that has so many complications and parameters that it's hard to put a pin in just how much they've changed society. Did you know my job was considered an essential service during lockdown? Along with, you know, plumbing, food delivery and hand sanitiser production? Go figure. Welcome to the future – now where's my flying car? Oh, right – have a look on youtube for footage of the newly available commercial models. Yup.

RECIPES



IMPOSSIBLE PIE

Mix together in a bowl

3 Eggs

½ cup self-raising flour

400 mls of milk

Salt and pepper

1 tsp chicken stock

Then you add all sorts of stuff, Tuna, Bacon, leeks, mushrooms, broccoli, ham, spinach, spring onions. Could be just whatever you have in the fridge.

Pour this into a baking dish. Sprinkle the top with grated cheese. Bake for 30 mins at 180c. Cool in the oven for 5 mins

IMPOSSIBLE PIE (THE DESSERT)

4 Eggs

1/4 cup of margarine

1 cup of white sugar

½ cup flour

1/4 tsp salt

½ tsp baking powder

2 cups of milk

1 cup coconut

1 tsp vanilla

Put all ingredients into a blender and mix until combined. Pour into a buttered 10 inch pie plate and bake at 180c for about 1 hour. The pie will have a crust on the bottom, custard in the middle, and coconut on the top. Make it this way once and then try adding the juice of 1 lemon for a tangy taste.

SELF SAUCING FUDGE PUDDING

1 cup self-raising flour

Pinch of salt

3/4 cup white sugar

1/3 cup cocoa

½ cup milk

60 grams Butter melted

1 tsp vanilla essence

½ cup brown sugar

1 cup water

3 tsp coffee powder

Sift flour, salt, white sugar and 2 tsp cocoa into a 2 litre casserole or soufflé dish. Stir in mild, melted butter and vanilla essence. Mix well. Scrape down the sides of the dish and level the top. Sift the brown sugar and remaining cocoa over pudding mixture.

Combine water and coffee powder. Microwave on high power for 2 mins. Pour carefully over the pudding.

Microwave the pudding, on high power for 8-10 mins or until the sponge rises up through the sauce. Serves 4.

KUMARA CASSEROLE

1kg kumara

1/2 c sherry

1/2 tsp salt

2 beaten eggs

1/2 c sugar


1/2 c butter

Boil kumara s with salt until cooked. Strain & mash with butter and sugar. Add remaining ingredients. Place into casserole dish & sprinkle with chopped walnuts. Reheat in oven 170 c until heated through Enjoy

Starting next week the park will be the alternative venue for practical training of Wintec students who are studying amenity horticulture, landscape construction, and arboriculture. The government's emphasis on trade training has doubled the student numbers this year. Hamilton Gardens is not able to provide hands-on practice for all of them. As we always have more work that can be done, we are keen to make this opportunity work for mutual benefit.

The Trust needs practical assistance from other volunteers. Volunteering Waikato has helped us describe and advertise volunteer positions to help with fundraising, enhancing the park's creative resources for schools and families, as well as basics like keeping the sculptures in good order. Using up the summer produce – zucchini chocolate cake recipe ,



It's the time of year when the garden is overflowing with zucchini. I planted five plants this summer, which are producing 2-3 zucchini a week. So we have a LOT of zucchini to use up.

I use them mainly in stir fries, curries, and pasta sauce. And I chop them and freeze them, to use all year around. But the extras don't go to waste, as I have used a few in this great recipe.

Zucchini chocolate cake

This cake is so delicious!

Preparation time: 20 minutes

Cooking time: 50 minutes

Total: 1 hour 10 minutes

Serves: 8

Ingredients

- 110g softened butter
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 3/4 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 2 cups flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 2 cups grated zucchini
- 1/4 cup ground walnuts (optional)

Method

Preheat the oven to 160 degrees C.

- 1. Grease a 20cm cake tin.
- 2. Cream butter, oil and sugar.
- 3. Add eggs, milk and vanilla essence, and beat well.
- 4. In another bowl, sift the dry ingredients together.
- 5. Blend the dry ingredients into the butter mixture.
- 6. Add the grated zucchini and walnuts (if using) and mix well.
- 7. Pour the batter into the prepared cake tin.
- 8. Bake for 50 to 60 minutes in the preheated oven, until a knife inserted into the centre comes out clean.
- 9. Cool cake completely before icing with chocolate icing.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT - 18 FEBRUARY 2021



Councillors returned to meetings at the beginning of February and the main focus this month has been briefings from staff around the Long Term Plan (LTP). The LTP sets out our vision, direction, work plan and budgets for the next 10 years and outlines how our activities and services will be managed, delivered and funded. With input from our communities, we develop a new LTP every three years – we currently refer to the 2018-2028 LTP and will adopt the 2021-2031 LTP in June 2021. As usual it is not easy to balance the budgets; however we are making good progress in our discussions.

To follow the process go to the web page https://shape.waikatodistrict.govt.nz/ltp The formal consultation process around the LTP will start late March / early April and I will be able to give you the consultation and meeting schedule in next month's newsletter.

Te Huia, the new passenger rail service launches on Tuesday 6th April.

All stations are completed, with public open days on 27th and 28th March.

I have previously mentioned that **property revaluation** advice would be received this month. However due to population growth in the Waikato district the valuers are experiencing delays in accurate data collection. Letters will now be sent out in March, date still to be confirmed.

Construction of the three remaining sections of the Cambridge to Hamilton **Te Awa River Ride** has started, including an underpass on State Highway 21, Airport Road and the \$2.5 million Mangaonua Gully section, which includes over 350 m of elevated boardwalk through the gully, associated earthworks, retaining walls and landscaping.

The project is jointly funded by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency, and the Government's COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund. Work was expected to begin on the eight-month build by the end of January, with completion earmarked for September 2021.



Once completed, the full Te Awa River Ride cycleway will span 60km from Ngaruawahia, through Hamilton and Cambridge, finishing up at Horahora, south of Lake Karapiro.
