
OPEN CUP RACE





Senior Camp







RECIPES

Apricot Loaf

Enjoy a hint of summer in autumn with this moist loaf with its apricot and citrus flavours. Great buttered for afternoon tea or toasted for breakfasts.

INGREDIENTS

Loaf

220g dried apricots

2c self-raising flour

220g sultanas

½ tsp vanilla essence

220g brown sugar

½c chopped nuts

1c tea

(optional) plus extras to sprinkle on top

2 beaten eggs

Icing

275g icing sugar

1-2 tbsp lemon juice

INSTRUCTIONS

Soak apricots, sultanas and brown sugar in 1 cup of tea overnight.

The next morning preheat the oven to 150°C.


Add the beaten eggs, self-raising flour, vanilla essence and chopped nuts if desired to the apricot. sultana mixture.

Mix well.

Grease and flour a loaf tin before evenly, spooning the mixture in.

Bake for approximately an hour, testing with a skewer or toothpick into the centre of the cake. Make sure it comes out clean with no streaks of batter.

Once the loaf is cooled mix together the icing sugar and enough lemon juice to make a thick icing. Drizzle over the cake and sprinkle with nuts.



Feijoas everywhere!

The Feijoa (or Pineapple Guava) has a distinctive flavour. It is an extremely versatile fruit, as it can be used in sweet and savoury recipes.

They are a New Zealand favourite, but are not native to this country, as they originally grew in Brazil, Uruguay, Paraguay, and Argentina. Feijoas were brought to New Zealand in the 1920s, and new varieties have been developed over the years.



EASY MICROWAVE FEIJOA CAKE

This recipe is adapted from a recipe in Edmonds Microwave Cookery Book.

Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup desiccated coconut
- 200 grams feijoa pulp (the middle of the feijoas, smooshed up)
- 50 grams butter
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 1 1/2 cups standard flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

Icing:

- 1 teaspoon butter, softened
- 1 1/2 cups icing sugar
- Water, enough to mix to a soft icing

Method:

Combine milk and coconut in a bowl. Leave to soak for about 15 minutes.

Place butter and sugar in a large microwave-proof jug. Cover and cook on high (100%) for 1 minute, or until butter has melted.

Add eggs, vanilla, feijoa pulp and coconut mixture. Beat to combine.

Sift flour and baking powder. Fold sifted ingredients into wet mixture until just combined.

Lightly grease a 20cm microwave-proof ring mould. Pour the cake mixture into the mould.

Cook in the microwave, elevated on a microwave rack (I don't have one of these, I put the ring mould on a plate), on high for 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 minutes, or until the top surface of the cake is just set.

Cover with a paper towel/tea towel and leave to stand for 5 minutes before turning out onto a cooling rack. When cold, ice with the icing.

Icing:

Place butter and icing sugar in a bowl. Add a little water, and beat well to form a soft, spreadable icing

Other fun things you can do with computers

Back in 'the day', my family had an old XT computer, what they called an 'IBM clone' back then or what we would call a PC now. With a black and white screen and limited power, it was eventually replaced by something more colourful, and we wondered what to do with it. As far as my recollection goes we hung onto it for many years, then when it came time to get rid of it I convinced Dad to allow me to put it in the Trade & Exchange – effectively the print version of what trademe is now.

At any rate, some young guy eventually bought the old thing for \$10, came and picked it up, and we weren't any the wiser. A week or so later I got a phone call from him thanking us, they'd used it in a music video where it was blown up and the explosion filmed. Dad wasn't pleased but I was amused. Now, I don't recommend using explosives on your computer (shards of motherboard are really hard to pick out of your teeth) but certainly there are some colourful and interesting things you can do with computers which sit outside the norm.

One thing many do is called 'overclocking', where you increase the speed of your CPU (central processing unit) to substantially above factory-issued levels. This's a tricky practice, and often involves a bit of elbow-grease and/or thermal grease, as most of the challenge is in terms of dissipating the additional heat generated. A lot of your success comes down to the individual chip. I still have an old Core2 computer which I overclocked from 3ghz to 3.9ghz without issue — a speed increase of about 30%. However most modern computers are so fast that this practice dying down somewhat, with the exception of competitions where they use dry ice or liquid nitrogen to cool the CPUs. Do not do this on a laptop.

On the recycling/re-use front, there're many instances of people using circuitry, motherboards, RAM and cards to create artwork, sculptures and the like. You need to spray-seal them with something afterwards, as otherwise they will rust and also chemicals will eventually leach out into the surrounding area. But done right you end up with a vaguely steampunk/techno-fetishistic look. You don't want to do this anywhere where people might rub up against the sculpture, as motherboards and the like are notoriously spiky in places. Which makes me wonder why one guy decided to line his garden shed with them...

Lastly, you can, with some guidance (see 'spiky bits' comment from earlier), give defunct computers to kids for them to pull apart and rebuild. In doing so they'll develop the skills and confidence necessary to build and repair their own computers once they're old enough to do so. Most of the adult males my age are still unconfident in pulling apart a computer (and most of the time, probably should be). So maybe that recommendation isn't only for kids. Always use a static strap, and never have it plugged in while you're working on it. Explosions are only for music videos.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 20 MARCH 2021



In my February newsletter I mentioned that Council is working through the 2021-2031 Long Term Plan (LTP). The Draft Consultation Document will be presented to Council next week for minor feedback along with any feedback on the communications and engagement approach and schedule for the consultation process. We will also confirm key dates and the next steps for the LTP.

The formal consultation period will be 7 April – 7 May with material, flyers, consultation material etc. being distributed to all Council offices and libraries, rural outlets, schools etc. and via a special E-newsletter, Facebook posts, media and

newsletters. There will also be drop in sessions in all Wards; the tentative date for the Eureka Ward drop in session is 28 April, 6:30pm - 8pm at Matangi Hall. A full list of confirmed venues and times will be on the consultation material and on Councils website.

Properties who are connected to the Southern Districts Water Scheme have been on Water Alert restrictions during the summer months. Council would like to thank everyone for conserving water and report that restrictions were lifted yesterday (19th March.) For more information check the www.smartwater.org.nz website.

The fire season is also coming to a close and while some restrictions have been lifted it is important to remember to double check before you light a fire.

Fire and Emergency NZ now handle everything to do with fires, including seasons, restrictions and permits. Before you light a fire check the www.checkitsalright.nz to make sure there are no restrictions.

Several decades ago the rural route between Cambridge and Taupiri was taken over by New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA) and a 'temporary' State Highway was created — State Highway 1B, a large section of which is through Eureka Ward. When the Hamilton Section of the Expressway is opened this year sections of SH1b will be revoked as a State Highway and handed back to Waikato District Council.

Council engineers and technical staff are currently working through the revocation process with NZTA and Ward Councillors in the relevant areas are being consulted. NZTA recently presented the results of an option assessment as part of the revocation project Fit for Purpose criteria. Included in this are options for the Tauwhare/Hoeka/Marychurch Rd and Telephone/Holland Road/Marshmeadow Rd intersections. A consultation process will take place around the various options; I will keep you up to date with the process via my monthly newsletters.

I have previously mentioned that at least once every six years Council is required to undertake a review of the current representation. "This is to ensure fair and effective representation for people and their communities, provide an effective voice, strengthen local democracy and help maintain confidence in local government. Waikato District Council is asking for input on potential representation arrangements for the 2022 local government elections as part of its representation review. This is a chance for the community to put forward suggestions on how they want wards, community boards and elected members arranged.

As part of the final stage of early engagement for the representation review project which we've named Reshape Waikato, we are releasing a geographic information system (GIS) tool that allows the public to create community board and ward models.

The tool will be open from Wednesday 3 March to Monday 5 April and the models provided by the community will be used to help our Council to decide on their initial proposal for representation arrangements in the middle of this year" and can be found on the following website:
