

To be honest we were rookies to farming and living rurally! James had grown up on a dairy farm but had been flying helicopters for the 10 years previous, mainly in Australia and Canada. He did all sorts from diamond exploration, crocodile egg collecting and mustering. He has always been very handy and able to fix anything.

Prior to moving to NZ, I was a detective in Surry Hills in the NSW Police Force and loved the variety of every day, helping the community and had a real sense of doing something worthwhile.

Vivienne is 5 years old and goes to school at Tauwhare; she loves her art and craft. She is mummas little helper and is 'usually' a very kind big sister.

Evelyn is our cheeky and mischievous 3 years old and a true farm girl, she likes to spend a lot of time out with the chickens, feeding them, cuddling them and waiting patiently for them to lay their eggs.

Bronte arrived in April 2020 right in the middle of our first lock-down. With all the uncertainty around Covid at the time we decided to try for a home birth, she was born in the bath at 5.13am and moments after Vivienne woke up, came into the bathroom and said "what was that horrendous noise." Having a home birth was the most amazing experience, being in our own home and safe space, I am a true advocate now and happy to discuss with anyone who is interested in thinking about it! Bronte is the happiest 14 month old now and is really starting to find her voice.

Whilst all this has been going on our farming business has grown to 560 milking cows on 163 hectares and we recently started grazing stock at Tahuroa Road, so if anyone wants their stock grazed let James know;)

I love the lifestyle that living rurally allows us to have. The children have the most amazing experiences and upbringing being on the farm and we feel very lucky about that.



MATARIKI

Matariki signals the Maori New Year. It is a time of renewal and celebration in New Zealand that begins with the rising of the Matariki star cluster which appears in the night sky during mid-winter. According to the Maramataka the reappearance of Matariki brings the old lunar year to a close and marks the beginning of the new year. Hence Matariki is associated with the Maori New Year.



The two meanings of Matariki both refer to stars; Mata arike (eyes of god) and Mata riki (little eyes).

Traditionally festivities were conducted to celebrate Matariki. They followed the harvesting of crops when the pataka were full, freeing up time for family and leisure. These festivities included the lighting of ritual fires, the making of offerings, and celebrations of various kinds to farewell the dead, to honour ancestors, and to celebrate life.

Matariki is a star cluster, not a constellation. There are about 500 stars in the cluster, but only six or seven are visible without a telescope. The star cluster is visible to the naked eye from most parts if our planet and has many names. In English it is called Pleiades (its ancient Greek name) or Seven Sisters. The Hawaiian name is Makali'i, or 'eyes of royalty' and in Japan it is Subaru, meaning 'gathered together'.

Many iwi speak of the Matariki stars as a mother and her daughters. The mother is Matariki, and her daughters are Tapu-a-nuku, Tapu-a-rangi, Waiti, Waita, Waipunarangi, and Ururangi. The eighth and ninth stars are Pohutukawa and Hiwa-i-te rangi.

AED (Automated External Defibrillator)

An AED is situated at Eureka Hall. In case of an emergency phone 111 for an ambulance and ask for the code to open the AED box.

The instructions for use are inside.

Ask for Ambulance Give the location of this box as shown below Ambulance Control will give you the code Remove Cover, Enter Code, Turn Handle





- Leave your bin or bag as close as you can to the roadside and clear of the letter box
- Place your bin or bag away from signs, power poles and trees. Make sure your bag in not overfull and that your bag is safe to carry
- Place your bag or bin out by 7:30am on your usual collection day. Remember to check www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz for public holiday changes.
- Remember if you don't put your refuse or recycling out right, it may not be collected.
- Wrap any broken glass or sharp objects thoroughly before putting them in the refuse bag
- Place a pre-paid sticker on each refuse bag available from supermarkets or Gull Eureka

Frequently asked Questions

1. Is there a limit to the number of refuse bags I can have collected?

There is no limit as long as each bag has its own clearly displayed pre-paid sticker. 20kg is the maximum bag weight and 60 litres in size. Any bag can be used e.g. calf meal sack, a dog biscuit bag, a black sack from the supermarket or a reusable plastic bag.

2. What can I put in the recycling crates?

You can put rinsed glass, plastic 1, 2 and 5, aluminium and cans. Cardboard and paper must be contained in a bag or a box or tied up with string and placed beside or under your crate.

3. Are pizza boxes recyclable?

If they are empty with no left-over pizza or crust, they can be put out for recycling.

4. What happens if I put something in my recycling that is not recyclable?

It will be left in your recycling crate (for you to put in your refuse bag) with a sticker attached and the reason for non-collection.

5. Can I put my cardboard out without a bag for collection?

We recommend putting it in a box, bag or tying it with string. Keeping it contained means it doesn't get blown around the road. (Supermarkets are good places to get boxes.)

6. What if refuse is dumped on the kerbside in front of my property?

Contact us on 07 824 8633 or 0800 492 452 and report any details you may have such as vehicle registration plate details, descriptions or photographs and we will take it from there. Do not attempt to remove it.

7. Why should I squash plastic containers?

Squashed plastic bottles are less likely to blow around in the wind and create more space in your crate.

8. Do I need to remove the lids from bottles?

At this stage there is no need to remove lids.

9. Where can I recycle soft plastics i.e. bread bags, biscuits wraps, frozen vege bags etc Until late 2018 supermarkets were providing a bin for recycling soft plastics. Unfortunately, this scheme has been discontinued. It has started up again in Auckland, but there are no plans yet to roll it out in the regions.

Wash & squash all containers

Leave the lids on all bottles and containers

Containers should NOT BE larger than 4L

Tetra Pak cartons are NOT accepted

NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT INFORMATION

Police 105 and Non-Emergency Contact

Members often send the volunteers information about criminal activities in their streets or local areas. For example, photographs of alleged burglars, evidence of damage to property, burglaries and petty thefts, as well as street racers, or suspicious activities requiring urgent attention.

Neighbourhood Support is a not-for-profit community based charity which is manned by volunteers. It is not or legally authorised or equipped to investigate these matters or to distribute information covered by the Privacy Act. Our facilities and services are not manned 24/7: when we do receive information we forward it to the police as soon as possible and to the police Hamilton Prevention Unit who are properly authorised and resourced to deal with it. This can take a few days according to our volunteer capacity.

If something criminal comes to your attention please send the information to the police and (of course) to members of your Neighbourhood Support Group (the whole point of Neighbourhood Support – looking out for each other).

105 is the number for Police non-emergencies. 111 is the emergency number for Police, Fire and Ambulance.

You can use 105 to report things that have already happened that don't need urgent Police assistance.

We encourage you to go online to 105.police.govt.nz to:

- Report any situation that doesn't require immediate Police or Emergency Services attendance
- Request an update on a report already made or add to an existing report.



It's a free nationwide service available day and night for New Zealanders and overseas visitors. Some private, corporate or government agencies have their own private telephone systems that may not have been changed to allow the number 105 to be dialled. If you experience this, please call 0800 105 105.

Other matters such as noise complaints, rubbish on streets, barking dogs, are dealt with by various <u>Hamilton City Council</u> departments.







KOOKING WITH KAZZA

ENERGY MUFFINS

2 cups grated carrot

½ cup coconut

1 cup sultanas

1 grated apple

½ cup chopped nuts(optional)

2 cups wholemeal flour (or 1 white, 1 wholemeal)

1 cup sugar

2 tsps baking soda

In a separate bowl mix together:

- 3 eggs, 2 tsps vanilla essence, 1 cup oil, pinch salt


Combine top 8 ingredients together.

Add egg mixture.

Mix all together.

Bake at 180 deg for 20 to 25 minutes.

Note - I find 34 cup oil enough.



SPICED APPLE CAKE

125 gm butter

2 medium apples grated with skin on

1 cup sugar

1 egg

1 1/2 cups flour

Topping:

1 1/2 tbsp butter melted

½ cup rolled oats

14 cup brown sugar


1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp baking soda

2 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp allspice

1 tsp salt



Preheat oven to 180 C.

Melt the butter, remove from the heat and add apples, sugar and egg.

Beat well and fold in the dry ingredients.

Line the bottom of a well greased loose- bottomed cake tin(23cm).

Pour in mixture.

Combine topping ingredients and sprinkle over cake.

Bake about 45 mins.

Humble little Garden on a plate - July

I can't believe it's past the shortest day of the year already! Which means we are coming into the second half of year and now already looking towards preparing for spring planting.

I have been busy adding compost, sheep manure and mulch to the gardens and fruit trees here at 1151. With only a wheel barrow and shovel and so many trees to nurture it seems to be taking some time however I suppose the days are only going to get longer from here on in. July is the time to ensure we have our soils enriched; our seedlings underway; our layout adjustments made to only make our jobs easier for the productive months ahead. I use to think yay great its winter! I can put my feet up but of late I have realised this is not the case at all. I would liken it to 'nesting'. Ensuring you have everything ready; and in place with a plan for everything to be productive, protected; enriched; organised; and thought put into collecting that extra water for the upcoming warmer months; located positions ready for that additional shelter, possibly shade cloth, reviewing last season and looking at improvements for this season. So much for putting the feet up!

It's a great time to be transplanting any trees that require improvement with placement. I have transplanted 4 citrus and working through my Fig cuttings to get my new lot of cuttings off to a great start, The simplest advice I have read to date in regards to this is to dig the hole for the tree twice the depth of roots; twice the width of roots that you intend to plant. Be careful to limit the root disruption when doing so and feed that hole before you put in place the tree into its new home, and secure it with stakes.

As mentioned last month our citrus trees were producing well this year, and we are enjoying some fantastic lemons and oranges. I've been doing my best to ensure to remove any fruit that has fallen under the trees as I read that leaving any fruit under the trees can increase chances of disease on the fruit tree and this is a simple way to avoid such troubles, and a great way to keep Hank and Amber happy by receiving the dropped fruit.

Well that's all from me as I have a lot to do still in the garden here at 1151! Take a look at the July Checklist and Kids enjoy the School Holiday page and make sure you take some time to get those seeds planted so you can start your spring planting in 6-8 weeks, and reap the rewards from your hard work.

Last month we mentioned that there were two remaining kids' garden giveaways available, I am very pleased to share with you two more 'amazing young gardening gurus' we have in our community. Both were well deserving of their starter packs and we at the Eureka Express and on behalf of Mitre 10 Morrinsville who kindly donated these packs hope they have been enjoyed by all of our winners.

Checklist July

- •Time to start preparing the soil for spring vegetable planting.
- •Begin to Sow vege seeds like Broccoli, Cabbage, Broad Beans, Onions, Spinach, Silver beet, in seed trays in a warm spot. Transplant to your garden in 6 – 8 weeks, or once they are approximately 4 cm high. If warm enough you can also sow Carrots, Parsnips and Beetroot.
- •Towards end of month Plant seedlings of Artichoke, Cauliflower, Lettuce, Onions, Potatoes, Rhubarb, Silver beet and Cabbage directly into your garden. Use a plastic tunnel if you have one or plastic bottles cut in half to protect seedlings when planted early.
- Feed spring bulbs in your garden with a side dressing of Bulb Food
- •Cut back untidy growth of perennial plants like Lavender, Canna lilies, Agapanthus, Fuchsia and Geraniums.
- Prune your deciduous fruit trees, citrus or grapevines. Ensure your cutting tools are sharp and clean and protect cuts with a pruning paste.
- •Get ready to plant a crop of early Potatoes. Place your seed potatoes in a tray in a sunny position for at least a month before planting. Once sprouts appear on the seed potatoes about 2 to 4 cm long, these are ready to be planted.
- •Your existing roses will now need a good prune. Ensure your cutting tools are sharp and clean; cut out any dead, diseased or damaged branches. Shorten branches back by approximately 1/3 and cut back to an outward facing bud.



NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKIKI DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 21 MAY 2021



Council met 25th-27th May to consider and deliberate submissions to the Long Term Plan; approximately 60 residents asked to be heard. We have now met to consider community feedback and make decisions on the major consultation items of our **Draft Long Term Plan (LTP) 2021-31**. These included a proposed general rate increase, the sale of pensioner housing and the future of the annual inorganic kerbside rubbish collection.

The following is the media release with details of our decisions.

"Councillors spent a day deliberating before settling on their ten-year strategy and budget, following 605 submissions and three days of hearings with residents who opted to speak on their submissions.

Following an initial proposal to bring in a 9% general rate increase, Councillors directed staff to work towards a general rate increase lower than the recommended option in the Consultation Document. Waikato District Council's Mayor Allan Sanson says that the decision around rate increases was a hard one.

"Many submissions opposed the proposed rate increases. We know that any rate increases are hard to bear, especially for those on fixed or low incomes. We acknowledge that this has been a particularly challenging LTP, balancing the needs of our growing and vibrant district with what people can afford today."

"I am confident we have reached the right balance between investing in our future growth and looking after our current needs. We are looking to reduce our proposed general rate increase from the proposed 9% in year 1. We are looking at 6-7% for the general rate increase in year 1 and a 9% increase to the Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC)."

"Despite having a smaller general rate increase than first proposed, we are still committed to the work programme we've outlined. In the end, a reduced roading subsidy from Waka Kotahi/NZTA has meant our local cost share has also been reduced," he said.

Council also agreed to sell its small pensioner housing portfolio to a responsible service provider. A majority of respondents across the district supported this decision, agreeing that it is more beneficial for all, including tenants, to move the units to a specialist housing provider, with controls put in place to ensure the tenure and conditions of current tenants.

Going against the majority of opinions expressed through submissions, and after much debate, Councillors agreed by way of a 8/5 vote majority to halt the annual inorganic kerbside rubbish collection in 2022. Waikato District is currently the only council in New Zealand to continue to offer a full annual kerbside collection.

Halting the service aligns to Council's Waste Minimisation Plan, which aims to reduce waste to landfill by 10% in the next three years. The service has significant safety issues and is becoming increasingly challenging and expensive to administer.

Responding to support for this service from the community, Councillors agreed to pull out all the stops to deliver alternative solutions for the community such as fast-tracking resource recovery services and focusing on waste minimisation education.

Rates Rebates - You have until 30 June to apply for the 2020/21 rebate.

Eligibility and benefits

- The maximum rebate for the 2020/21 rating year is \$655.00
- The Gross Income threshold starts at \$26,150.00 (if you earn more than \$26,150.00 a year you could still be eligible)
- The additional income allowance for dependents is \$500 per dependent.

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




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
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


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
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
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
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Unusual uses of Steel
