Hi beautiful Eureka community,

It is such a pleasure to introduce our family to you!

We are a family of 3 (plus some animals) living in Eureka for 3 and a half years now.

Wojtek, my husband, Paul, our 8 y.o boy and me, Elena, plus our 2 cows, 5 chickens and an uncounted number of bees. Wojtek was becoming a professional football player in Germany when an accident during a soccer match resulted in the amputation of his leg. As a para-athlete, he started track and field with enourmous success, competing in 3 Paralympic Games (Athens 2004 – Beijing 2008 – London 2012), winning 4 Golds, 2 Silvers and a Bronze for Germany. I was a professional High Jumper for Italy for 17 years and met Wojtek in Germany, where I moved for my sport. I became national champion and participated in two European Championships. Since we met, Wojtek and I became an inseparable couple, and he eventually became my coach and my husband.

At the end of our sport careers, we decided to help amputees in need all over the world, who were less fortunate than Wojtek and did not have access to health support. We came up with a crazy idea, which became reality after 3 years of preparation: Sailing4Handicaps, a non-profit organisation (www.sailing4Handicaps.de). We bought a Catamaran, Imagine, rebuilt the galley to transform it into a workshop where we could build up prosthetic legs, sailed from Germany down to NZ for 5 years and stopped in 3rd world countries where we built and donated prosthetic legs for free to a total of 90 people. Our trip was one to remember forever, and on the way our son Paul was born. We became scuba diving instructors and Wojtek also a free diving instructor. In 2019 Wojtek, who is an athlete at heart, decided that there was not enough done for para atheletes around diving. Working together with several world leading diving associations, he set 5 world records in free diving in Tahiti.

At the end of 2019, just before COVID, we arrived in New Zealand and decided to make this beautiful country our home. Wojtek saw that Para Badminton, a sport that he played a bit in Germany, was at the Paralympics. He had a go with Badminton New Zealand and was directly the best athlete in the country - so good that New Zealand granted him citizenship to have him starting in Paris 2024, which he eventually did as the only able or disable athlete for Badminton from New Zealand, ending the campaign at 7th place making us all very proud. Wojtek 's Badminton career brought us to Eureka, a halfway point between Hamilton, where he trained, and Cambridge, were Paul goes to school, and I teach art.

Yes, I forgot to mention, I am a professional artist and illustrator, owner of The Sewing (www.thesewingsailor.com), a fine art and luxury stationery brand. I work for known overseas brands, am gallery represented in NZ and exhibiting abroad. I have an established art teaching programme running in Cambridge and Waikato, and I am also teaching from my home studio.

Paul is an amazing boy in love with nature, football and animals. He is very social and always trying something new out.

The house in Eureka was just perfect for us to have animals, and so we launched in the

adventure of owning cows, chickens and our own bees. We love the adventure and learning about it every single day. I love gardening and you can often see me around the fruit trees or in the veggie beds working or picking up flowers to paint and decorate the house.

We own a Manuka Honey company called Manuka Royale (www.manukaroyale.com) which is a sustainable and ethical 100% NZ made brand, mainly focused on export, but we also sell in several New Zealand shops around the country. Both Wojtek, Paul and I are very community centred. I do a lot of volunteer work between Cambridge and Hamilton and Wojtek is Para Fed Waikato vice president, Child Cancer Foundation NZ and UN ambassador.

We love our small community and could not do it without our amazing neighbours, who are always ready to help us when we need to travel or have a question about our cows.

Thank you, Eureka, for being such a small piece of heaven for us and to allow us to grow up our child with joy and happiness in a safe and lovely environment!

Thanks Eureka, Newstead, Tauwhare and Matangi friends for everlasting memories.



### SH1B Telephone Road to reopen next year

Transport Minister Simeon Brown has confirmed that State Highway 1B (SH1B) Telephone Road in Waikato will reopen in 2025, following agreement by KiwiRail and the NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) on a package of improvements to enable the road and rail crossing to function safely and effectively together.

"Economic growth, productivity, and safety are a priority for the Government, and I'm pleased a pragmatic and cost-effective solution has now been found to enable SH1B Telephone Road to reopen to vehicles and freight," Mr Brown says. "SH1B Telephone Road has been closed since April 2022 after repeated instances of low vehicles damaging the railway tracks at the level crossing.

"The proposed improvements will see the road level raised, new escape lanes built and improved signage and road marking. The road surface will be raised by up to 410mm over a distance of 90 metres on Telephone Road north of the rail crossing and on Telephone Road/Holland Road/Marshmeadow Road south of the rail crossing.

"Escape lanes built on the north side of Holland Road, either side of Telephone Road, will ensure longer vehicles heading south do not stack across the rail line as they wait to turn into Holland Road. For vehicles travelling east on Holland Road and wanting to turn left into Telephone Road, the escape lane provides a safe place to wait if access to Telephone Road is blocked by a train.

"NZTA expects to have a confirmed contractor for the works on board before the end January 2025, with construction expected to be completed before mid-2025.

"I want to thank locals who travel through this area for their patience and perseverance while this crossing has been closed. I am pleased that NZTA and KiwiRail have found a sensible solution as part of our plan to get people to where they want to go quickly and safely. I look forward to work being completed and the road open in the first half of 2025."

We all have concerns about our privacy however the contact people are likely to be known by you and the numbers will be kept only by one person, and your privacy would be respected. We are only concerned about your safety.

#### Ladies a Plate



#### Pavlova-crispy on outside and meringue on the inside

6 egg Whites, at room temperature

2 Cups Caster sugar

1 tsp vanilla essence

1 tsp vinegar

2 tsps cornflour

Preheat the oven to 110c. In a large metal, porcelain or glass (not plastic) bowl beat the egg whites until soft peak form. Gradually, a teaspoon at a time, add the caster sugar. The mixture should be getting glossy, thick and shiny with each addition and the whole sugar adding process should take at least 10 mins. Beat in the vanilla, vinegar and cornflour. Spoon the mixture out into a plate- sized mound on a baking —paper-covered tray. Bake for about 1½ hours until it is dry and crisp and lifts easily off the baking paper. Cool on a wire rack. To serve, place it flat side up on a serving plate, a pile with whipped cream, cover with your favourite fruit (berries', Kiwifruit, lemon curd is also very nice.

#### Cranberry and pistachio white Christmas squares

375g white chocolate melts

¼ cup cream

1 cup dried cranberries

100g shelled pistachio nuts

Melt white melts with the cream.

Fold through the cranberries and pistachio nuts

Spoon into a lined 20cm-square tin and smooth with the back of a spoon, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for an hour or until set.

Remove from tin and use a sharp knife to slice into small squares.

#### Tamahere-Woodlands Councillors' update December 2024

#### SH1B Telephone Rd re-opening mid-2025

After more than two years of lobbying and behind-the-scenes discussions about potential solutions between Waikato District Council, local community representatives, KiwiRail and NZ Transport Agency, Transport Minister Hon Simeon Brown has made the very welcome announcement that the Telephone Rd rail crossing will re-open by mid-2025 after NZTA does the work needed to make it safe.

It's great to see that community connectivity still means something in New Zealand and that a local community and their Council can work with Government and government agencies to get good outcomes. Local communities in the Tamahere-Woodlands Ward from Gordonton to Tauwhare and further south - including Eureka, Puketaha, Newstead, Matangi and Tamahere - can look forward to restored travelling links to school, work and home. Deserved thanks go to the local Re-open Telephone Rd lobby group, and local representatives who gave up their time to meet with Council and government agencies several times. Thanks to Federated Farmers Waikato president Keith Holmes who weighed in on the issue and to Waikato MP Tim van de Molen for listening to his electorate. Thanks to local Councillor Mike Keir who proposed some alternative options, and to Council staff for helping coordinate local discussions. And of course thanks to Hon Simeon Brown for making it a funding priority and to NZTA for finding an affordable and safe solution. #### Drinking water safe despite elevated arsenic levels

Local councils and public health authorities have confirmed that drinking water supplies in the region remain safe despite slightly elevated levels of arsenic detected in drinking water sourced from the Waikato River within the last couple of weeks. Arsenic in the Waikato River is primarly due to geothermal activity. The 'maximum acceptable value' for arsenic in New Zealand drinking water is 0.0100 milligrams per litre, but Watercare and Hamilton City Council have reported slightly higher levels on three occasions in late November (the highest being 0.0115 mg per litre). National Public Health Service regional clinical director Dr William Rainger says arsenic limits in the NZ drinking water standards are based on the level of risk from a lifetime of drinking water so slightly elevated levels for a short period of time are not cause for alarm. Tamahere-Woodlands Ward residents with connections to reticulated water supplies are supplied by Hamilton City through an agreement with Waikato District Council. The Ward includes the villages of Tamahere, Matangi, Tauwhare, Newstead, Eureka, Puketaha and Gordonton.

#### Work continues on 3 Waters CCO and new roading contracts

Waikato District Council is still investigating two options to establish a Waters CCO (council controlled organisation) either with Hamilton City or with up to seven other Waikato district councils. The scale of both proposals is expected to deliver substantial savings in the long term, but both need careful analysis and any final decision incorporated into our 2025-34 Long Term Plan which will go out for consultation early next year.

Road maintenance work in Waikato district is currently delivered by the Waikato District Alliance through a contract between Waikato District Council and Downer established in 2015. The contract was extended in 2020 and is due to expire on 30 June 2025. The Council has sought tenders to establish two new contracts for the next 10 years (initially five years with rights of renewal) covering the northern and southern halves of the district. The new contracts are expected to be awarded in February 2025 for a 1 July 2025 start date.

#### **NZTA** roadworks

SH21 Airport Rd - Resurfacing work on SH21 Airport Rd near the Narrows Bridge is planned by Fulton Hogan for NZTA for the week commencing Sunday 15 December. The work will be done between 8pm and 6am over two nights between Sunday 15 December and Thursday 19 December. During these times SH21 Airport Rd will be closed to through traffic between Clearway Rise and Narrows Lane. There will be a detour of about 20 minutes through Hamilton along SH3 and SH1/SH1C. However, emergency vehicles will be allowed through the worksite, as will local residents needing access to their properties. Residents on Narrows Lane will be escorted through the worksite.

Waikato Expressway - The Waikato Expressway section between Taupiri (Gordonton Rd interchange) and the Lake Rd interchange is expected to re-open from midday Friday 6 December after two weeks of full closure for maintenance work. The northbound detour is via Ngaruawahia and the southbound detour is via SH1B, Bankier and Horsham Downs Rds. After that any remaining work will be done with traffic sharing lanes and the occasional night closure if needed.

Two related detours remain in place until 15 December: (1) The south-bound on-ramp at the Taupiri-Gordonton Rd interchange is closed until mid-December so south-bound travellers will need to use the SH1B detour to access the

Expressway at the Lake Rd interchange. 2) Northbound traffic on SH1C will need to exit at Lake Rd then head south on the Expressway to turn at the Resolution Dr interchange to head north again.



## **Gardening Tips**

### What to do this month

Pinch off side laterals from tomatoes to encourage better fruit production and allow for better airflow. Side laterals are the small shoots that sprout in the angle between a tomato plant's main stem and its branches. These can be planted up for free plants.

Plant more beans – there's still time to plant a second crop of beans. Beans sown now will feed you until the first frosts. Water regularly – water stressed plants are a sitting target for green shield bug.

You can never have too many salad greens during summer. Sow lettuces, rocket, radishes, spring onions and carrots every fortnight for a continuous supply.

Lettuces are magnets for slugs and snails. Foil the critters by growing African marigolds nearby. Slugs and snails apparently like them better. And keep water up, as a drought – or heat-stressed plant will be more vulnerable to attack by pests too.

Fact: A snail can lay up to 120 eggs at time every six weeks or so. Every snail disposed by now won't be around to contribute 500 or more babies to the potential explosion over the rest of the season.

If you're growing crops in pots move them out of direct sun. Shift them so that they either get morning or afternoon sun, but shade for at least half the day. This cuts down issues with evaporation and keeps roots cool, reducing the likelihood of plants going to seed








| ☐ Hold your mail or have a neighbour collect it A pile of mail on the front doorstep, or envelopes pouring out of your mail slot, is an instant tip-off that no one is home. Ensure parcels are delivered elsewhere.   |
| □ Create the illusion that someone is home Suggestions include leaving a radio on, using timer lights, leaving a car in the driveway, having someone mow your lawn, keeping curtains open, and not tidying up too much.  |
| □ Don't tell the world you'll be away as tempting as it is to share on social media about your upcoming trip, perhaps consider only posting about it once you're back. The last thing you want to do is tip off the wrong person that you're away!   |
| □ Notify a trusted neighbour, friend, or family member Make sure at least one person you trust has your holiday contact details and a spare key so that they can check-in on your place while you're away or respond to an on-site emergency. Something as simple as a fire alarm beeping non-stop might need tending to while you're away.  |
| $\Box$ Keep your keepsakes safe Use a fireproof safe to lock up any jewellery, sensitive documents, and valuable items; and if possible, hide the safe somewhere that a burglar is unlikely to look.   |

A Neighbourhood Support sticker on windows or on your letterbox is also a great idea! |
